After 23 minutes in which Venables hit a post, and Bridges and Moore hit everything else in sight except the net, Chelsea scored.

It was a great goal, made by Blunstone, Tambling a n d Bridges, before Blunstone finished the move.

Within six minutes Luton were level. Goalkeeper Dunn fumbled a shot from Luton's best forward, Dave Pacey, normally a wing-half, and Turner hit the equaliser.

Chelsea seemed to be battering on a white wall of flailing bodies, with Bridges missing most only because he tried most. Even so, I counted five times he failed to score from within six yards, once hitting a post.

A penalty looked more and more Chelsea's last chance. Finally one was given against Bramwell for handling as he cleared Murray's attempt off the line (67 mins.). Tambling took it neatly and calmly, and at last Chelsea were ahead to stay.

Tambling's goal nine minutes later, brilliantly taken though it was, merely confirmed this.

Manager Docherty gave this reason for dropping Kevan:

"He's not used to our ways—he needs to sit and watch for a few games to see what we require."
