Hat-Trick Gives Town Points By CHILTERN

MORE great opportunism by Ron Davies, the centre-

forward now firmly in line for a Welsh Under-23 cap, gave the Town a badly-needed victory over Swansea at Kenilworth-road last night. He scored all three goals, went close on other occasions,

and generally led the Swansea defence a dance. He was the outstanding forward, though he received pretty good support from Brennan and Clapton. Two of Davies's goals came in the first half which meant that

the Town were sitting reasonably pretty. They had some luck early in the second half when their defence, unhappy under pressure, had some fortunate escapes. The danger was that Swansea would get another goal and stage a grandstand finish but the defence, with Kelly dominating

again, stood firm in the time of Crisis. These two points could be the means of keeping the Town in the Second Division.
