TINETEEN minutes from the end Tommy McKechnie got Luton's third goal and sealed the Western League team's fate. The goal didn't come a moment too soon for Luton, who never looked confident of victory.

It came from a breakaway as did McKechnie's first goal six minutes earlier. And at this stage the Bridgwater's part-timers were giving Luton everything they had got-and the Third

Division team's defence looked worried.

But Luton's defence, pretty sound throughout, survived, and the side went on to win because they seized their chances better.

Luton took time to adjust themselves to the atmosphere of the small ground and conditions made worse by steady rain. In the first-half Bridgwater paid Luton more respect than they deserved.
