

# Ron Baynham's save swings it

**Bridgwater ..... 0**

**Luton ..... 3**

**L**ITTLE Bridgwater go back to the obscurity of the Western League nursing a couple of grievances, writes **BRIAN SCOVELL**.

The first is against their Third Division Cup conquerors Luton for not sending back 1,400 unsold tickets early enough for Bridgwater to re-sell.

Manager Bill Brown told me: "I reckon we could have got rid of £100 worth of those. And £100 is a lot of money to a club like ours. A week's takings.

"Luton only sold 100 tickets, and didn't post the rest back to us until Wednesday. It was 11 o'clock on Saturday before I had them."

Grievance No. 2 was a good-natured one against Luton's 34-year-old ex-England goalkeeper Ron Baynham.

Just after half-time when Luton were a goal up and holding on against tremendous Bridgwater pressure Baynham dived to push away the shot of the match from Bridgwater's talented 18-year-old right-half Marcus Scott.

"That save was England class," said manager Brown "It cost us the game."

Luton manager Bill Har-

vey admitted: "We were a bit lucky. Territorially, Bridgwater had more of the play. Ron's save was the turning point."

Tom McKechnie scored two of Luton's goals late on, bursting through Bridgwater's offside trap.

Centre-forward Gordon Turner got the first with a hopeful shot which goalkeeper Len Beal turned into his own net when he lost his footing.

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
