


INSIDE THE COTTAGE

HAT a topsy-turvy sport this is! After leaving Ipswich with the Boxing Day blues following a 10—1 slaughter, we visited Portman Road two days later, full of confidence for the return match. But Ipswich, fully recovered from this double-figured disaster, turned the tables with a 4—2 victory.

In the first encounter, Graham Leggat planted his name firmly in the record books with a goal-a-minute hat-trick.

His three goals in as many minutes was the fastest ever recorded in Division 1 And, to round of f a truly memorable day, Graham had a hand in three other goals and scored our tenth.

The only trouble is, matches are not played on paper. The Cup has a reputa-

tion for shock results and many teams from Division 3 and 4 have been responsible for famous giant-killing acts.

So, although Luton have unfortunately slipped a long way since they reached Wembley in 1959, there is no sense of complacency at the Cottage.

Johnny Haynes and the team are determined that—unlike last season—Fulham's name will go forward to the fourth round draw this time.



LUTON TOWN

O UR guests this afternoon—unlike Fulham—have first hand experience of playing in an F.A. Cup Final. In 1959, Luton reached Wembley where, after an exciting tussle, they lost, 2—1, to Nottingham Forest.

The Luton Town story began in 1885 when the club was formed from the merger of Luton Excelsior and Luton Wanderers. They became original members of the old Southern League and proved themselves an outstanding club.

Bubbling with confidence, the Town decided they were good enough for the Football League and applied for a place. Their first application was rejected but, in 1897-98, they were accepted into Division 2.

Luton found they could not quite make the grade in this higher-class competition and, after three seasons, returned to the Southern League.

But their worries were still not over. They could not hold a place in Division 1 and, in 1911-12, Luton were relegated.

Then came the 1914-18 war. Afterwards Luton put a great deal of effort and enthusiasm into team rebuilding.

The result was that when Division 3 of the Football League was formed Luton returned to the fold.

For 14 years they remained in Division 3. Then, in 1936-37, they won the championship, scoring 103 goals and gaining 58 points. During this memorable season, Joe Payne scored ten goals for the Town in a match against Bristol Rovers.

One of the most exciting seasons for Luton came in 1954-55, when, along with Birmingham and Rotherham, they finished at the top of the table, level on points. Goal average gave Birmingham the title, with Luton second and Rotherham third. So Luton moved into Division 1 for the first time. They stayed there until 1959-60. Since then, Luton have taken a further downhill slide and are now fighting to hold a place in Division 3.

PEN-PICTURES OF OUR VISITORS

Ron Baynham (goalkeeper): Has been with Luton since 1951. Was previously with Worcester City. Played for England and the Football League and was a member of the F.A. touring team in South America, 1959.

Bob Morton (full back): Has played in most positions for Luton. Played for England "B" and has twice been reserve for the full International XI. Has been with the club since 1948.

Alan McBain (full back): Born in Aberdeen. Played for Carlisle last season when he attracted the Manager's attention. Transfered to Luton in exchange for J. Lornie and A. Ross. A very sound and capable defender.

Dave Pacey (wing half): Very strong player who likes to be among the scorers. Played for F.A. and England Under-23 teams. Born Luton, he signed for the club in 1956.

Gordon Fincham (centre half): A dominating centre half. Moved to Luton in July, 1963. Previously with Leicester and Plymouth.

John Bramwell (full back): Former Everton player who moved to Luton in 1960. A very capable defender who played successfully at wing half several times last season.

Harry Walden (outside right): Joined

Luton from Kettering in January 1961 and stepped straight into the first team. Severely injured at a crucial part of last season's programme which pre-ented him from taking any further part in the struggle against relegation. It is hoped he has lost none of his skill as a result of that injury.

Ray Smith (forward): A versatile forward who hit many goals when with Peterborough. Came to Luton from Northampton early this season.

John O'Rouke (centre forward): Ex-Chelsea player who moved to Luton in November, 1963. Quickly won himself a first team place. Has a good shot in either foot and can play anywhere in attack.

Gordon Turner (forward): Luton's leading scorer for eight seasons, he combines ball-playing skill with a tremendous shot. Has played for the F.A. and the English League.

Tom McKenchie (inside forward): A first team regualr, he joined Luton in 1960-61 season from Scottish Club, Rob Roy, Born at Glasgow.

John Reid (inside forward): A recent recruit, he moved to Luton from Northampton in November, 1963. An energetic player who has quickly settled down with his new club.


