A MINOR revival is going on at Luton, but these two points were secured by sheer determination and fighting spirit rather than pure football ability (writes GRAHAM BURTON).

Shrewsbury played it hard and tough which seemed to come as a shock to some of the Luton players accustomed to the more genteel approaches of the upper circles.

However, to their credit, they withstood some hard tackling and accepted a situation that called for

a good deal of grit.

In the opening stages Shrewsbury, moving smoothly, looked as if they might have the Luton defence in trouble.
