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For Harber, who made his debut in League football at Queen's Park Rangers yesterday week, this was his first game before the home fans.

The alterations brought back Ron Baynham, only survivor of the 1959 Cup Final team. Lownds, and Whittaker, So we had three 19-years-olds in attack and one-Riddick—who has just turned 20.
