again showed a better appreciation of what was needed
because they kept the ball
moving forward and hoped for
mistakes to occur.
Occur they did, and unfortunately, Baynham made
two of them which resulted in
the two Watford goals. The
first came after 28 minutes
had produced almost not a
single worth-while shot from
either team.

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A goal kick by the goal-keeper went to a Watford player and, in the end, WEL-BOURNE shot from over 30 yards and the ball went in just inside the post, with Baynham seeming to attempt to stop it by sticking out a leg.

One of the features of the early play was the inaccurate passing of the Town who played into the hands of the Watford defence which showed good covering and positional play.

However, they did come more into it and there was one tense moment in the home goalmouth following a centre by Pleat, who also forced Goy to save.

For the Town there was a good share of the second-half play, but although the margin against them was so slight, they did not really threaten to draw level, although Riddick headed just over.

It looked as if the single goal would suffice when Wartford suddenly sealed it five minutes from the end. A long through ball caught Baynham unprepared because he came out too late and it was pushed to Owen

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The winger's centre was reached by the goalkeeper, but not collected, and SAUNDERS made no mistake about snapping up the chance.

Because of injuries to Jardine and Whittaker, a reshuffle of the whole left flank was necessary a n d although the result of it was largely disappointing, it did produce one thing of value.

That is that in Barton, who is just completing a month's trial, the Town have a left-back of real ability and polish, while others were struggling to control the lively ball, he did so comfortably and always there was some real purpose about the way in which he made his clearances.

Always cool and collected, Barton can use either foot and, on this showing, is a distinct asset to the team.
