IN just seven minutes, Scunthorpe removed in decisive fashion any slim chance the Town might have had of avoiding relegation and ensured that they will face life next season in the hard surroundings of the Fourth Division.

One of the most remarkable starts to a match this season, led to Scunthorpe, who had five defeats immediately behind them, building up a three goals lead, and it could have been longer, against a Town defence that was all at sea.
