EVERYTHING combined to make this the occasion for the Town's biggest crowd of the season.

After their draw at Chester on Wednesday Barnsley were unchanged, but the Town were forced to make an alteration because Jimmy Gibson was unfit. His place at outsideright went to Billy Harber, having his first serious match for nearly six weeks, after nursing a painful ankle injury.
