He found himself with two Barnsley forwards to cover 12 yards out and when Ferguson shaped to pass but shot instead the cannoned off the hapless Reid into the net.

With virtually the last kick, Dick Hewitt stood astonished as his intended centre was swept over Tinsley's head into the net by a

trick of the wind.
