games.

## Favourites

Badly hurt 15 minutes from the end goalkeeper McGuire carried on gamely with his task as the last ditch defender. He left the field to a rousing ovation.

McGuire's spirit and Torquay's basic football skills symbolise why they remain favourites for promo-tion. Despite the paucity of their attacks, two of them produced cracking goals. Torquay opened the score in 23

minutes with a beautifully controlled drive by Stubbs into the top corner of the net. But only 30 seconds later O'Rourke broke the stunned silence with the equaliser.

Rioch then caught McGuire flatfooted in the 57th minute to put Luton ahead. In another 11 minutes Whittaker sent in a pass which sent the defence the wrong way, and O'Rourke snapped it up gratefully.

Torquay's Barnes reduced the lead following a disputed free-kick in 79 minutes. But this was just a flash-in-the-pan and Luton ran out worthy
