WHILE the result was not so close as the final score would tend to indicate, the fact was that the Town, even taking into account the fact that they were weakened by injuries, did make rather heavy weather of this match at Kenilworth Road on Thursday.

At the same time, it would be wrong to detract from the merit of a useful Barrow team which has never quite been good enough to blossom forth as

promotion challengers.

This was the completion of to be a serious miss because the Town's home programme PILKINGTON cut the arrears, in which their record is quite clearly the best in the Fourth Division because they have dropped only six points out of 46, and, in addition, they earned the title of being the most prolific home scorers in the country.

On this occasion 10,647 fans had to overcome something of a shock start because Barrow took the lead in the 19th minute through MARSHALL after Read had done extremely well to keep out his first attempt.

Arrowsmith.

There were nine minutes left before half-time when that happened, and although Barrow played some useful-looking football in midfield afterwards and the Town made some pointed threats, we had to wait until the closing stages for the real excitement.
