LUTON'S OWN pitch was their worst enemy yesterday. And the man who said so after this disappointing display was Luton manager Alan Brown.

The sticky surface foiled their attempts to play their usual game, which is to keep the ball

moving fast.

At the same time manager Brown admitted that his team had created enough chances to have won comfortably, and that a point was lost through bad

finishing.

Chief offenders were David Pleat—who made up for his misses by scoring Luton's equaliser after 65 minutes—and Gordon Riddick, who twice miskicked when it looked easier to score.

down.
