## Chances galore but they slip away

LUTON TOWN were well on top in their important home game against Chester this afternoon, but once again their first - half finishing did not match their approach work.

Two minutes after half-time, Keith Allen headed them into the lead with his second goal in his first two appearances since he arrived from Stockport.

Conditions at Kenilworth \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* Road this afternoon for the visit of Chester, fellow strugglers with the Town in the re-election zone, were pretty much on a par with those of last Saturday.

Once again, the pitch was dry and there was a strong, blustery wind, mainly blowing down the pitch from the Oak Road end.

After the sudden move of Gordon Riddick to Gillingham, there had to be something of a reshuffle in the Alan Rivers Town team. came in at centre-half for the first time since early September, and Max Dougan, who has been continually in the middle since he arrived here from Leicester in December, moved to right-half.

With David Pleat swelling the injured list, there also had to be a change at centreforward, where Tony Read appeared for only the second time this season. That necessitated a change in the pattern of the Town's attacking plan, because Keith Allen was designated for the linkman role.


