DOUGAN WAS OUTSTANDING

Without doubt, the Town's outstanding player was Dougan, who dealt easily with

Ingle and whose heading of the ball was a good deal more decisive than it has been on some occasions.

Dougan was a dominant figure in a defence in which Conboy showed measureable improvement and Moore covered well.
