Lack of finish spoils good work in midfield

LUTON TOWN found struggling York City a harder nut to crack than they had expected at Kenilworth Road this afternoon and 54 minutes went by before they nosed ahead with a penalty goal.

The City shocked the Town by taking the lead in who embarked on a long, amthe first half, and though Rioch got an equaliser, Luton's lack of finish was letting them down.

After a promising enough start to the day, it turned out to be a murky afternoon, with drizzling rain which undoubtedly affected the attendance. There looked to be about 6,000 at the start.

With a centre-forward problem to solve, Rodney Green being in hospital, the Town tried Billy McDerment there, and this enabled Max Dougan to take over at right-half—a move which manager Allan Brown has been wanting to make for some time.

The Town's other change was the return of Graham French to outside-right after injury, Micky Brown being the one to stand down.

Without a win this season, York made three forward changes, one of them posi-tional, involving the recall of the experienced Tommy Spencer, last season's top scorer, and Rowland Horrey.

The pitch, newly seeded at the end of last season, was showing distinct signs of wear and tear, particularly on the main stand side.

BIG CLUB SCOUTS ARE THERE

Scouts from West Ham, Fulham, and Manchester City were present, although they gave no indication of their target.

Neither team was adapting itself well to the difficult conditions. The ball was shooting off the wet surface at an astonishing pace at times.

Whittaker, who had been caught in possession several times, suddenly blossomed out with a determined run which he finished with a centre. Allen narrowly failed to get his head to it, but the ball went for a corner kick, from which Rioch headed a couple which Rioch headed a couple of feet wide.

Read then had to move quickly to snatch up a back pass by Dougan as Horrey raced in. Moore sent French away to put Town on the move again, but the winger was guilty of too much elabor-

With 21 minutes gone, York shook the Town by taking the lead. McDOUGALL ran on to a well-made pass by Spencer, and with the Town defence somewhat dilatory in its covering, the inside-right had little difficulty in stabbing the ball past Read.

season.

On balance, the Town were creating more openings than York but were lacking finish so that several useful chances went astray.
