Inaccurate passing lets Town down

THE TOWN found it hard to make progress in their match against Chester at Kenilworth Road this afternoon. With inaccurate passing by the home forwards, and a packed Chester defence, the first half proved an unexciting affair.

Both sides found the lively ball a handicap, and although the Town did most of the attacking, there was a disappointing lack of constructive football to serve up to the holiday crowd.

INACCURATE

PASSING

The Town's bid for an early lead came to nothing because of inaccurate passing.

A foul on Rioch by Ash-

worth brought a free kick from Moore, which was headed away by Evans before danger could develop

The ball was very lively and there were several instances of it running too far in advance of the Town forwards — there were three forwards — there were three goal kicks for this reason.

There was a shock for the Town when Chester suddenly broke away down the right, where Haddock beat Jardine to a bouncing ball. Read dived to his cross without getting a touch, and the ball finally went behind.

The first clear-cut chance came the Town's way when Allen headed the ball over to Whittaker, who waited a frac-tion too long in making his shot, which cannoned off Jones

Play was scrappy at first, but there followed a sudden surge by the Town in which Allen headed towards what was apparently an open goal, Evans raced across, but the there were ten players back in their penalty area, leaving only Loyden upfield.

A header by Rioch made a possible opening for Allen, who did not react quickly

A foul by Evans on Buxton gave the Town a chance of making progress, and Slough pushed the ball to Rioch, who from fully 35 yards let go a low shot which missed nar-rowly, with Carling scuttling across his goal.

Rioch now was beginning to impress himself upon this game, spraying out passes. From one of these Whittaker did well to get the ball across. but unfortunately it went straight to Turner.

Another free-kick came to

the Town out on the left when Haddock barged Jar-dine off the ball un-ceremoniously, but this went

to waste.
Carling had to come rushing out almost to the edge of his penalty area to pick up a bouncing ball from Jardine as Whittaker closed in.

FREE-KICKS FREQUENT

Free-kicks against Chester were becoming frequent and there was another for a foul on Whittaker, which Moore placed high into the goalmouth. Buxton, in a duel with Evans, turned the ball wide with his head.

Left with a half chance from a difficult angle, Rioch blazed a pass from Whittaker high and wide

CAUGHT IN POSSESSION

Inaccurate passing continued to be a barrier to consistent Town progress, and there was the added point that the way in which Chester were playing meant that the forwards were too often being caught in possession

Metcalf shot over when Chester made one of their infrequent advances, and then Jones (L) set in motion an attack which Dougan nipped in the bud.

TWO CORNERS TO TOWN

Two corners in quick suc-cession kept the Town at the Chester end and the second was caught by Carling after Buxton, frustrated in his attempt to get a head to the ball, had tried to punch it.

Eventually we did see the ball in the net—the Town's. Loyden planted it there after a succession of miskicks, but the referee disallowed it for offside, a decision with which the centre-forward obviously disagreed.

PRETTY DREARY FARE

It was still pretty dreary fare, with little constructive football, and not much in the way of goalmouth thrills either.

There was the chance of one when French eluded his captors and provided a pass for Allen, who however turned

the ball in towards Turner.

When French again got the ball across to Allen, the centre-forward was concerned in what looked suspiriously like a sandwich though he headed the ball, it bounced slowly to Carling.

GREEN REPLACES ALLEN

With balf an hour to go, the Town made a change, sending on Rodney Green for Allen, in an attempt to provide the missing goal punch. There were cheers when it was seen that Green was coming on, and sympathetic applause for Allen as he walked off.

The Town were still having more of the play, without inspiring much confidence in their ability to secure the vital first goal.

There followed a stoppage when Jones (R) was injured. He went over the touchline for further attention, but returned after a few seconds.

INJURY TO TURNER

It looked as if Chester had brought on their substitute prematurely, because almost immediately afterwards Turner was injured in a tackle with Green. This reduced Chester to ten men, with Turner receiving atten-tion from the trainer and an ambulance man outside the touchline.

Turner, who had a facial injury, was able to return—not to his own position of centre-half, but instead at

centre-forward.

Hopes of a late goal were revived when the Town had a free kick as Singleton barged into Buxton, but Chester funnelled right back in front of goal.

free kick to Chester landed safely in the hands of Read, and then French making ground at full speed was pulled down from behind by Bennett.

Again the free-kick was cleared promptly, to be fol-lowed by one against Buxton as he tangled with Singleton.
