BLUES

We extend greetings to Luton Town, champions of Division Four last May, in their first appearance at Priestfield since their disastrous season of 1964-65, our first season in the upper division.

We won at Priestfield on the 24th October, 1964 by five goals to nil and the teams were:—

Gillingham: Simpson; Stacey, Hudson; Arnott, Burgess, Farrall; Newman, Yeo (3), Green (2), Gibbs, Meredith.

Luton Town: Baynham; McBain, Jardine; Pacey, Caleb, Bramwell; McKechnie, Pleat, Chandler, Reid, Whittaker.

Robin Chandler was a late deputy for Gordon Riddick. Later in the season we won at Kenilworth Road by two clear goals and the poor Hatters descended into Division Four.

In three seasons in the lower division, Luton gathered 56 points, failing on goal-average only, 41 points and then a championship 66 points.

They have continued their good form and at the time of writing are fighting for a top place in Division III.

We met a promoted side at Oakwell, Barnsley, last Saturday, and after surviving some pressure we counter-attacked and scored the goal that mattered late in the game. At Rotherham on Tuesday night against a relegated club, we played some of our best football and succumbed to a charge-of-the-not-so-light-brigade goal.

With the departure of Tony Thear to Southern League Bedford Town and nagging injuries to Tony Weston, David Peach and Mel Machin, we are having to play weakened sides in the Football Combination Cup and the South-East Counties League, but this has had the obvious advantage of giving all our apprentices experience in the higher grade and has left vacancies for triallists in the junior side. All three sides are occupied today.

SPOTLIGHT ON . . .

RAY BAILEY

Ray was born at Bedford in May, 1944 and as well as being captain of his school rugby team, he represented Bedfordshire Schools as a goalkeeper. He worked for four years as an accountant, playing for Bedford Town as an amateur before turning professional, and also had a trial with Southampton. Northants C.C. offered him a place in their cricket side as a right arm fast bowler and on his debut, in June 1963, he took 5 for 82 against Kent. The cartilage operation he underwent at the end of last season prevented him from playing at all this summer.

Ray recently celebrated his first wedding anniversary with his wife Jane, who is a teacher by profession and watches him play regularly. An all round sportsman, he enjoys golf and billiards, collects coins and stamps, and is now taking courses in both football and cricket.

His most memorable game, he recollects, "was against Exeter City in the Cup, when I scored the winning goal to put Bedford through to the next round." This was the start of a run that ended against Everton in the Fourth Round following which Ray signed on for the Gills on Friday, 13th May, 1966. When his playing days come to a close he aims to return home and take up dairy-farming.

WEST HAM UNITED

TALKING ABOUT LUTON . . .

Luton Town, the beaten F.A. Cup Finalists of 1959, were formed in 1885 by the amalgamation of Luton Wanderers and Luton Excelsior. Since those early halcyon days the club has known many vicissitudes and there have been times when even the existence of the club was in grave doubt.

The 'Hatters' are the oldest professional club in the South of England, because in 1890 an offer of 5/- per week was made to three local players. At the end of that season it was decided to pay the whole of the team the sum of 2/6 per week, plus an extra sixpence for away games and payment for working time lost before noon on Saturday.

On the formation of the club the colours worn were navy blue and pink halves for caps and shirts, both of which, it was recorded in the minutes, "shall be worn by each player on the field". The colours changed to 'cochineal', then to sky blue before the present scheme was adopted in 1920.

The Town's home ground is at Kenilworth Road, where recently multi-coloured seating was introduced and the record attendance of 30,069 was established against Blackpool in a F.A. Cup tie on 4th March, 1959.

Ten Luton players have represented their countries whilst with the club and these include J. Payne who holds the Football League record for the most goals scored in a game when he netted ten in the 12-0 victory over Bristol Rovers in 1936.

Man in charge at Luton is Allan Brown who added the Fourth Division title to their honours list last season; previously they won the Division Three (South) championship in 1936-37.

SCRAPBOOK OF TEN YEARS AGO ...

Season 1958-59, the first of the Fourth Division, did not get underway until 23rd August; there was the interesting prospect of new opponents, but also the less inspiring thought of the long financially unrewarding journeys north. There were no pre-season friendlies with other clubs in those days, so the strength of the team could not be assessed until after the season had begun. We opened our programme with a local derby visit from old rivals—Millwall, but it was a bad start and the Lions won 2-1, with goals from Crowshaw and Pacey. Dave Laing netted the Gills solitary reply. The Gillingham line up on that day was—Simpson; Parry, Hannaway; Proverbs, Hughes, Laing; Bacon, Patrick, Saunders, Edgar, Pulley. Manager Harry Barratt blamed the defeat on, "bad marking from corner kicks." However the club won 2-1 both at faraway Carlisle, in a midweek clash, and 2-1 at Walsall, (which in those days was a happy hunting ground). They followed this by drawing the next two home games with Darlington (0-0) and Carlisle (1-1). Thus so far they had a 100% away record but had yet to win at Priest-field! They occupied 7th position in the Division Four table.

The Reserves, playing in the last season of the old Kent League had drawn 2-2 with Sheppey, 3-3 at Faversham and won 3-1 at Chatham.
