Offside tactics anger crowd

IN a dour and scrappy first half the Town had great difficulty in finding a way through the massed Orient defence, and there was not a great deal of action in either goalmouth.

The crowd showed their resentment at Luton's repeated use of the offside trap, and at the other end the Orient were always ready to halt the Town's advance by the most robust methods.

Harrison was also at the match, and he, too, feels he has a chance of being ready in midweek.

Of the 14 players named by Orient yesterday, Key and Rofe were omitted, and player-manager Jimmy Bloom-field, who has been on the injured list, nominated himself as substitute.

In these early stages the Town were showing up well, and they had another free kick for a foul on French, but Goddard pulled down the winger's high lob.

Once again the covering was tight, and the tackling hard.

BIRTHDAY CHANT

Rioch tried to put an end to this with a speedy run which ended with him being brought down by Harper some yards outside the penalty area. He was well off the target with his free-kick.

Even so, a section of the Luton supporters appreciated the effort because they began to chant "Happy birthday to you"-Rioch was 21 yesterday.

With a quarter of an hour gone neither goalkeeper had been seriously tested, and that looked like emerging as the pattern of a game which was proving to be dour in character.

Maybe the liveliness of the ball was partly to blame, but the passing of both teams was not of high quality, and this was not helping achieve real continuity.

Brabrook once looked dangerous when he rounded Dougan, but the ending was anti-climax as he placed the ball behind from a good position.

Obviously, the winger could be a threat to the Town given the right sort of service, and he sparked off another raid during which Rioch brought down Halom some ten yards outside the penalty area.

Mancini went up and headed Brabrook's free kick high and wide.

swung the When play swung the Town's way again, Lewis neatly headed on to Sheffield a long clearance kick by Read, but the centre-forward's shot from outside the penalty area was deflected for a corner, which French wasted placing behind.

Dougan came across to save a nasty situation with a quick clearance when Massey had been left with a chance by Allen.

Sheffield was working hard, and he earned another corner, again on the left. French did better with the kick this time, though the rush for the ball came to a premature end when Sheffield was penalised

for pushing.

Much of the passing was still sub-standard, and to add to the frustration of the home crowd, the Orient forwards were being caught offside all too frequently.

LYING DEEP

Halom was lying very deep, and Massey and Slater were the Orient strikers. So deep was Halom that Rioch was mostly picking him up in mid-

Inability to control the light ball was causing many raids by both teams to break down, and play was pretty ragged and scrappy. After half an hour came

he first casualty. Massey developed a heavy limp which received treatment from the trainer.

Goalmouth action was still sparse, and Read easily saved a lob from Halom. The Orient crowd were far from happy about the way in which 'heir forwards were being caught offside, and were expressing their dissatisfaction vocally.

Then came a great effort by Rioch who latched on to a clearance which rebounded. As Goddard came out desperately, and the Orient defenders closed in, Rioch shot for goal from 20 yards and then watched the ball curl inches wide. It was a splendid opportunist effort which came near to breaking the deadlock.

Slough was having something of a battle with Halom, and was penalised again after the inside-left had floored him in the first place.

ne came back to make a rackle. He apparently damaged his back, and looked in some pain.

After treatment on the field, he was taken over the touchline, and the Town concinued for the time being with ten men. However, he was quickly back.

When Orient were again caught offside, slow hand-clapping and booing broke out from the crowd. When Dougan was caught in two minds near the centre line, Bloomfield gained possession to race through and make a centre to which Moore dived to clear.

Then the Town had a stroke of bad luck in the 65th minute when they had a goal disallowed. It was made by Lewis, who picked the ball up smartly on the left from a throw-in and made a deceptive shot that Goddard, challenged by Sheffield, could only help into the back of the net.

The Town's joy was quickly turned to despair when it was seen that the referee had given Orient a free-kick-presumably for obstruction by Sheffield on the goalkeeper.

With 67 minutes gone French, still feeling the effect of his injury, was brought off and McDerment came on at cutside left.

Just before he left, French and put the goal in jeopardy by an ill-judged back-pass which Jardine could not reach and Slater missed a good chance by sending over.

Now the Town were beginning to settle down again, but gaps were still extremely diffi-cult to find in this close-packed defence.

FIERCE DRIVE

Rioch showed his worth with a fierce right-footed drive from the edge of the penalty area that beat Goddard completely, only to miss a post by inches. There were appeals by the Town that the ball had been deflected for a corner, but a goal-kick it was.
