THE THIRD DIVISION SCENE TODAY'S MATCH COULD DRAW **DIVISION'S BIGGEST CROWD**

The visit of near-neighbours Luton Town, the best supported Third Division club, could draw the biggest attendance anywhere in this division this season. Luton top the list so far with the 19,315 for their home game versus Mansfield Town.

The chart below lists Third Division clubs according to their average attendances for League matches up until last Saturday; it also indicates the highest and lowest crowds on each ground to date. Watford, incidentally, drew Reading's top attendance of 11,926 when we wrecked their 100 per cent home record.

Worst gathering in this section was 2,592 for Southport v Gillingham but, before we start despairing as to how any club can exist on such pitiful support, it is worth making some comparisons with the French First Division. When Ajaccio recently entertained Sedan their fans knew that victory could well place them on top of the table. Arsenal, in such a situation, could guarantee a 35,000 gate . . . Ajaccio's attendance was just 2,500!

On that particular day the top French attendance was 15,000 to see their champions St. Etienne meet Nantes in a top-of-the-table battle, and only four other grounds reported five-figure attendances.

The following weekend, three Dutch First Division matches fell below the 10,000 mark with FSC drawing only 6,000-about the average attendance enjoyed by our Gillingham—for the visit of DOS Utrecht.

One interesting point emerges from the chart below—Luton's highest attendance was bigger than the aggregate at Southport for all their matches so far!

There has always been excellent relationships between the officials of both clubs and today it is our turn to play hosts to our friends from Bedfordshire. May we appeal to both sets of supporters to exercise restraint and behave themselves and not resort to violence. Well, our visitors managed by the astute Allan Brown, their ex-inside forward in their First Division days, have made an excellent start to the season and are making all the running in the division at the moment. Brian, who plays a wholehearted game and is one of our most consistent players, has an excellent past record and is certainly not a vicious player.

Next Tuesday evening we journey to Walsall for a Third Division League match, kick-off 7.30 p.m.


We have been asked by the Football Association to stage an Amateur International on Saturday, November 9, when England play Wales. We have gladly accepted the invitation.

TODAY'S OFFICIALS

Mr. Norman Burtenshaw makes his first appearance at Watford this season, his last visit being December 30, 1967, on the occasion of our match with Bournemouth. He has now served seven years on the Football League list of referees and also on the F.I.F.A. list. In 1965 he was a linesman at the Cup Final between Leeds and Liverpool and was in charge of the Amateur Cup Final in 1966. He has also had several appointments in the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup and European Cup Winners Cup.

Mr. Grey comes from Gorleston and is making his first appearance at Watford Mr. Goodfellow comes from Birmingham, although he is a Geordie by birth. By profession he is a Technical Superintendent in charge of the Chemistry Department ments and Inter-Cities Fairs Cups appointments in that time. Much of his spare time is devoted to the administration of junior football in the Birmingham area where amongst other appointments he is Vice-Chairman of the South Birmingham League of Referees,

He commenced his refereeing career in 1952 and has been on the Football League list for eight seasons and has received many F.A. appoint-Secretary of the Central Birmingham Alliance and Secretary of Birmingham University.



Welcome to our Visitors

Billy McDerment (left back). Was signed from Leicester City as a right back but most of his team appearances were at left back. At one time last season he was almost the permanent substitute and in all, managed 20 first-

team appearances which qualified him for a championship medal. Terry Branston (centre-half). For him last season was a personal triumph because, not only was he a member of a promotion team for the fourth time during his career, but he fulfilled his ambition of making the full quota of League appearances. Born at Rugby, where he still lives, Branston spent nine seasons with Northampton Town, accompanying them in their rise from Division IV to Division I.

Ian Buxton (inside-right). When Rodney Green went down with cartilage trouble early last season, there had to be an immediate search for another striker, and Buxton was signed from Derby County for about £11,000. Missed the beginning of the season because of his commitments with Derbyshire for whom he is a very useful all-rounder.

Max Dougan (right-back). First signing made by Allan Brown shortly after he rejoined the Club. A fee of about £7,000 changed hands when this ex-Scottish amateur International left Leicester City, his caps having been earned with Queen's Park. With the arrival of Terry Branston, the idea was to convert Dougan into a right-half, but he finally settled in at right-back where he was a regular for the greater part of last season.

Graham French (outside right). Born Wolverhampton. Has previously played for Shrewsbury, Swindon, Watford and Wellington before joining Luton in October, 1965. Has several Youth International Caps for England.

Keith Allen (centre-forward). At the moment it is difficult to forecast exactly where Allen will settle down this season. Originally he began at inside-right, but spent the bulk of last season in the middle; in the pre-season practice matches, he has been playing at righthalf, where he turned in some superlative performances in emergency during last season. This is a position for which competition is likely to be particularly brisk. Signed from Stockport County in exchange for Derek Kevan; previously with Portsmouth and Grimsby Town.

Luton Town

Bruce Rioch (inside-left). Without doubt the Town's biggest asset as a player and he is just 21. Is a natural footballer whose skill developed quickly last season, when he was easily the club's leading scorer even though he was used as the midfield link. Was born in Aldershot, but spent most of his schooldays in Luton and has been with the Town since he was 15.

Alan Slough (right-half). Is a true local product because he was amateur and apprentice with the Town before signing as a full-time player. In his early days he was a full-back and could conceivably still be required for this position, but plays extremely well in either wing-half berth.

Tony Read (goalkeeper). Begins the season, as he did last time, when he missed only three matches, as the first choice goalkeeper. Yet there was a time when it looked possible as if he would make a name for himself in the forward line. Probably holds the distinction of being the only goalkeeper to have scored a hat-trick in League football. Was born at Haydock and began his career with Sheffield Wednesday before moving to Peterborough United. Joined Luton three-and-a-half years ago.

Brian Lewis (right half). At the moment, it is by no means clear where the Town's most expensive signing for years—from Coventry City—will finally play. In the temporary absence of Ian Buxton, Lewis is destined to start at inside-right where he had considerable experience at Portsmouth and Coventry. However, most of his 20 First Division games last season were in the half-back line.

Mike Harrison (outside left). During the latter part of last season, several favourable reports were submitted on this player, who was then with Plymouth Argyle. These induced the Town Manager to make a £7,000 offer to his former Luton right-wing partner, Billy Bingham. who is now in charge at Home Park. Born at Ilford, Harrison began his first-class career with Chelsea, from which club he moved on to Blackburn Rovers where he established a first-team place.

Laurie Sheffield (centre-forward). One of the Town's big close season signings from Oldham Athletic. Born in Swansea has been with five League clubs.

Graham Hickley was happy when I spoke to him after the Bournemouth match but, apparently, if the "Hornets" lose, his parents tell me, he frequently goes straight to his bedroom and mopes.

Graham, aged 14, is now in his fourth season watching the "Hornets," and during this time the number of home matches he has missed can be counted on the fingers of your hands. He has also been to quite a few away games, and two of these will always stick in his mind for quite different reasons. One of the first away matches he ever saw was the F.A. Cup game against Corinthian-Casuals, when Watford won 5-1. And the highlight of this game, as far as Graham is concerned, was when Duncan Welbourne, playing at right half, sped down the right wing with the ball and from the near corner flag had a shot-cum-cross which completely deceived the opponents' goalkeeper and rocketed into the corner of the goal. The other game was last season's match at Lowestoft, when locally everything was under several inches of snow and many games had been called off.
