Luton's lead, in fact, lasted only four minutes before Smith thumped in an equaliser.

And Luton's hopes faded late in the game when Clemence made a world class save at the feet of Husband who had raced away on his own.

Though they might not have managed to win today, there is plenty of reason for optimism in the Luton camp. In the first half today they were just as good as Liverpool — maybe better.


