He was talking in the Kenilworth Road boardroom after the Town had romped to a 3-0 win over Bristol Rovers, to narrow the gap between themselves and the leaders.

Explained Mr Stock: "We get lots of shouting and cheering when we are attacking. But we also want it when we are hanging on. That's what football supporters are for — to support. We've got a grand crowd here, but we could do with a bit more noise."

There was plenty to shout about last night. Luton played some delightful football and were never really extended by a Rovers attack that contained elegant individuals but little punch.

It was one of those polite nights. Luton, ahead after two minutes with a Sheffield header, never looked like being upset. Bristol were outstandingly sporting, and while they were winning, Luton were content to keep it on the: "After you, Claude," basis.

Not a flinch

Most significant point of the night, apart from the fact that Luton won, was the return to first team football of Bruce Rioch, the club's forward star who had a cartilage operation only six weeks ago.

Rioch came through without a flinch. Playing on the left wing, he did not have a difficult night, in spite of a fine performance from Rovers right-back Bobby Jones.

Rioch showed several glimpses of his exciting ability when he moved into the middle in the second half, and embarked on determined runs down the middle.

He did not look too keen on the wing position where he looked hampered by the touchline. Once he escaped its shackles there were signs that Rioch is just about ready for League football again.

Well placed

Thrilling

Clever Bristol winger Ken Ronaldson almost upset things in the first minute of the second half when he should have scored from a low cross, but he gave Sandy Davie time to pounce.

with Allen, Moore and Slough covering well in midfield and prompting the forwards, Luton rarely looked troubled, and in the 62nd

minute Brian Lewis scored a thrilling goal after being put through by Sheffield. Lewis worked well all evening, and looked sharp in the penalty box. He took his goal with a cool head, chesting the ball on and beating Taylor with the hard rising shot.

Inside-forward Bobby Brown scared Luton with a drive against a post that rebounded on to the back of the diving Davie's head, but Rovers wasted the opportunity.

Slough had another active night, and, back in his midfield role after deputising at centre-half, he looked smooth in attack and had several good shots either blocked or saved.

Classiest

The match kept at the right temperature. It was well-modulated and attractive to watch. While you always felt Bristol were holding something back, they looked tight enough in defence to stop Luton scoring again.

Yet five minutes from time Allen scored a goal that must rate among the classiest of his career. And it came from a situation that had looked most unlikely to produce a goal all night — a corner.

Throughout the piece, twin centre-halves Stuart Taylor and Larry Lloyd, both huge men, had ruled the goalmouth — especially in the air. But with the crowd calling for an improvement in goal average, Allen screwed into the air to blast home a French corner with his head.

French was again the best forward, but Allen and Lewis both put in commendable effort. Sheffield had hard work against the lofty defence, but he did his bit by scoring the opening goal.

Winger Ronaldson had a splendid match for the visitors.

Now for Gillingham. Last night's match was the first of four at home. Luton cannot afford to slip up. They won't if they play like they did last night
