# TOWN MISS VITAL POINT

IT was not for the lack of effort or application that the Town failed to score in the vital match with Southport at Kenilworth Road last night. However, the loss of a point, only their third at home his season, was seriously damaging to their promotion chances, which, with only three points coming out of the last eight, are now taking on the appearance of a long-shot.

A crowd of 15,693 saw the Town pressing relentlessly for much of the match, but being unable to find a way through Southport's blanket defence.

Crowning blow for the Town | was the loss of their goal-keeper, Sandy Davie, who was carried off injured 11 minutes from the end.

Certainly the Town were desperately out of luck from all points of view, but credit must be given to Southport's defence.

In addition to being with-out Bannister, still suffering from gastric trouble, the Town lacked the services of Allen, but were in the fortu-nate position of being able to bring back Branston after absence through injury.

Even though Southport were obviously going to fol-low the popular fashion of deep defensive tactics the Town were prominent early on and Keen headed wide from a centre by French.

Then Slough, being given more freedom after being restored to the right-half posi-tion, caused Reeves to scamper across his goal as the ball went just wide of a

Quite the best effort came at the end of a persistent run by Jardine, who brought Reeves to his knees at the near post to deal with a hard drive.

Then Lewis tried to head a spectacular goal by throwing himself headlong at a centre made from the right by Rioch, but at such a pace was the ball travelling that the inside-right could only glance it wide.

Southport were managing to break out, not with a great deal of threat until Moore conceded a free kick for a foul just outside the penalty area. From this, Peat, right up in front of goal, missed his kick completely, otherwise the Town might have been in dire trouble.

#### FELLED

When the Town came back again, Slough raced into the penalty area where he was tackled by Russell (M) and went down. The referee considered the tackle fair, but Slough was hurt and had to attention. Numbers were meaning

little as far as Southport were concerned because Curwen, wearing three, had settled in at right-back, the number seven, Russell, was in a deep defensive role and Redrobe, 11, was occupying the place approximating to right-half. Strangely, one of the two strikers was the right-back, Altey. Just what all this was supposed to add up to was a trifle baffling. Another Town casualty was

Jardine, who damaged his right ankle in a tackle and resumed limping.

A long free kick by Moore

was cleared to French whose first-time kick was yards too high. Although the Town having much more of the play

they were not being able to penetrate the deep defensive plan of Southport and the forwards were finding themselves closely marked. Between them, Altey and Andrews caused some con-cern at the Luton end before

Jardine, who was doing well, relieved the situation by passing back to Davie.

With the Town pressure in-

creasing, Reeves, harassed by

Slough when Harrison lifted the ball into the goalmouth, had to give away a corner. Then Rioch, left with an open goal after a ricochet, was pulled up for off-side, only eight yards out. Southport were

certainly contriving to leave few gaps, either in mid-field or at close quarters and the Town were

rarely getting a clear shot at goal.
At the same time, Southport break-aways were becoming less frequent, and in one of them Redrobe was reduced

to making a hopeful shot from

fully 35 yards.

This was merely an inter-This was merely an interlude in the Town pressure and a mistake in defence nearly cost Southport a goal, but in the end Reeves just managed to snatch the ball away from Harrison.

Certainly the pattern of the game had not brought many thrills for another large

for another crowd, but there was a chance for the Town on the half-hour when Reeves was penalised for carrying the ball too far.

This brought the Town a free-kick just inside the penalty area and after some difficulty in getting.

cuity in getting Southport to stand ten yards away, Slough drove the ball at the dfensive wall and it flew wide. It looked a corner, but the referee's verdict was a goalkick. Slough stood and appealed

for a penalty when he was pulled of the ball.

The referee, however, would have no truck with it, and Slough might have been better advised to carry playing.

It was still pretty one-sided with Southport content to defend and the Town still trying to work out the answer to the problem.

A long free-kick by Dougan looked promising a Lewis did well to reach and with his head only to see the

ball swing wide.

Slough and Keen were now able to give almost undivided attention to attack and the former was des-perately unlucky when he slipped into the penalty area, unmarked for once, and his shot was so close that it landed the ball on the top of the net.

### LAID SIEGE

There now began a terrific siege on the Southport goal, during which Reeves was hard pressed to push away a free kick by Dougan, and Rioch kick by Dougan, and Rioch had a fierce drive deflected for a corner. placed well,

position Branston received kick in the face as he chal-lenged Altey, who was penal-ised. After a brief examina-tion by the trainer the centrehalf played on. Then suddenly when South-

port attacked in some strength it needed coolness by Brans-ton, who gave away a corner, to get the Town out of trouble. Meanwhile Jardine had re-ceived another knock on his

right ankle which necessitated further treatment.

That sortie apart, it continued to be nearly all Luton, who however, still could not

find a way through. On the stroke of half-time Lewis appeared to miss a close-range chance, but the whistle had already gone for

PRESSURE

Buxton, anxious to re-establish himself, won a corner that Branston reached with his head, but someone in the goalmouth scramble hooked the ball off the line.

Then Rioch again was prominent, nearly harassing Aindon into putting through his own goal. As it was, the Town had to be content with another corner, which Reeves punched clear.

Slough was fouled near the touchline and French's free kick brought a terrific on the Southport goal without anyone being able to make contact.

When they did break out, Southport were quite danger-ous and a shot by Curwen threatened to spring out of the hands of Davie, who, however, made a quick recovery.

There was a chance for the Town when Rioch was allowed to go on from a palpably offside position, but Aindon made a last-ditch dive to put the ball behind and Branston's header from the corner was cleared.

With the second half half-way through, the Town were becoming almost frantic in their efforts to score, but this massed defence was showing no sign of cracking.

At times the pressure was intense.

Another free-kick to the Town brought a terrific melee which ended with Buxton trying an overhead shot and sending the ball too high. Some good work by French

set up another raid in which Lewis joined, but after a good build up Keen headed the ball the wrong way.
