Although they were denied the victory they deserved, the Town's display, especially in the first half against Millwall on Tuesday, was the best they have put up for some time.

Certainly, there was no hint from what went on on the field that Millwall operate in a higher division and that, at one time last season, they were on the verge of a promotion bid.

Though there was mild disappointment for the majority of the 17,000 crowd that the Town could finish only on level terms, the general consensus of opinion was that it was first rate entertainment and, certainly, there was plenty of all out action.

### Will be Optimistic

Even allowing for the fact that they will have ground advantage, the replay at The Den on Monday will be no walkover for Millwall, and the Town will make the short journey in an optimistic frame of mind.

However, the likelihood is that they will find the Lions a vastly different proposition, with their own vociferous

fans urging them on.

Not that the Town will lack encouragement because they are likely to take hundreds of supporters to New Cross in the hope of seeing their team qualify for the third round of the League Cup.

### Three Away Matches

This will be the first of three consecutive away matches, with two more coming over next weekend.

First, the Town try conclusions at Valley Parade on Saturday with newly promoted Bradford City, who have already demonstrated that the upward step has not been too much for them.

Before today's game, they were still unbeaten and holding second place a

point behind the Town.

Football in Bradford has been in the doldrums too long and it is really astonishing that more success has not come recently to a city of that size.

#### **Vast Potential**

Certainly, there is a vast source of potential support for a first-class club and for too long the game in that part of the world has been dominated by nearby Leeds United.

Now, Bradford City seem to have a forward looking policy and if they maintain their good start, they may be one of the clubs with which the Town will have to compete when the honours are distributed at the end of the season.

They rather emphasised the point by their League Cup win at Sunderland this week.

On the following Tuesday, the Town make the long trip to Southport where they gained a hard earned point last season in atrocious conditions.

#### **Similar Records**

This was their first reward from the Haig Avenue ground, their previous visits having ended in defeat by 4-1 and 3-2.

Their record at Bradford is somewhat similar because they forced a 2-2 draw on their first appearance at Valley Parade and suffered defeat by 2-1 and 2-0 on their subsequent visits.

However, these results came during the days when the Town were not widely regarded as a dangerous team when on tour.

#### **Great Resolution**

Now, things are very different as they have demonstrated in their first two away games this season which they won at Bournemouth and Gillingham, assignments which were both reckoned to be in the difficult category.

On each occasion, the team showed great resolution, this being particularly the case last Saturday when desperate Gillingham tried their best to throw the Town out of their stride by their highly rugged approach.

#### **New Penalty Taker**

Their tactics were not calculated to produce an attractive match, but the Town came through a difficult situation pluckily and there was never much real doubt about the destination of the points, once Malcolm MacDonald succeeded

with his first attempt from the penalty spot for his new club.

Today, Bristol Rovers are strong, attractive opponents. In several quarters they are fancied to become one of the stronger teams in the Third Division this season and they have already shown the ability to score with readiness and regularity.

#### **A Shock Result**

Their 5-1 win at Reading recently was one of the shock results of the season and they come here this afternoon with the avowed intention of going out for both points and not, as do so many visitors, trying to shut things up defensively in order to hold on to a point.

If they do show attacking intent, then this match may well prove to be one of the most attractive of the season.

#### **Much Hangs on Result**

Certainly, in the short term, quite a lot hangs on the result because both teams begin with an unbeaten record and the Town will welcome a convincing win to give them confidence for their stint of three consecutive away matches.

Today marks the first appearances, at home, of Chris Nicholl, from Halifax Town, and Matt Tees, the former Charlton Athletic centre-forward.

The former, of course, has already impressed the fans by the quality of his display for Halifax Town here recently, but few have seen Tees in action.

#### **Effective Link Likely**

Both came creditably through the test at Gillingham and Tees gave every indication that he is likely to strike up very quickly an effective link with the other striker, MacDonald.

Neither will be available for Monday's visit to Millwall, Nicholl having been ruled out of further participation in the League Cup through having played for Halifax in the competition.

Tees is out because he has not been a Luton player for the requisite fourteen days, but if things go in the Town's favour on Monday, he will be ready and available for the third round.

As an extra to our fixture list comes the League Cup replay with Millwall at The Den on Monday and supporters should note that stand tickets at 11s each are now on sale at the club's offices.

With the kick-off timed for 7.30 there is bound to be a big following and those who are going should note that the ground is situated in Coldblow Lane, New Cross.

### Best Route to Ground

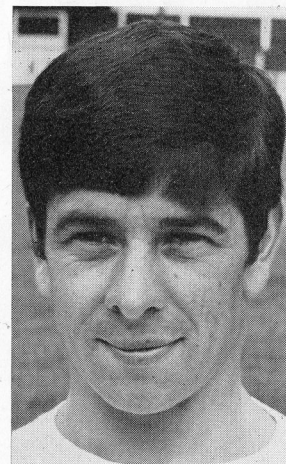

Neat, consistent defender who has been with the Town for nearly twelve months, being signed for £8,000 from Crystal Palace last October.

Went straight into the first team, initially as a midfielder player, but the majority of his thirty League appearances last season were made at left-back and he became a valuable member of the back four.

Before this season began there were ideas of using him in midfield, but events have so shaped themselves that his role has become defensive again.

Born at Chesterfield, he has had considerable experience because, apart from his stay with Crystal Palace for whom he made over 100 League appearances, he also had spells with Scunthorpe United and West Bromwich Albion.

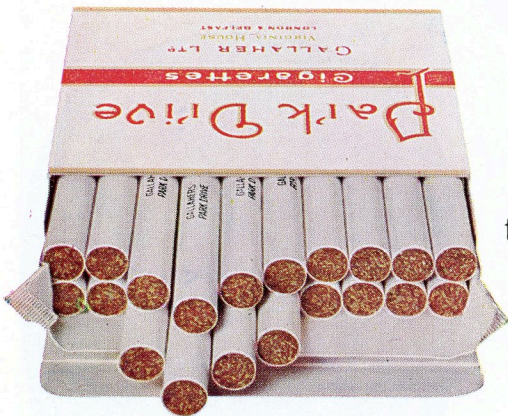

## Bristol Rovers go for Goals! *By Tony Pullein*

**B**ristol Rovers committed themselves to an all-out attacking policy this season and it soon paid off. They struck thirteen goals in their opening five League games, including a magnificent 5-1 trouncing of Reading on their own ground.

New striker, Robin Stubbs quickly settled to his task, hitting three of those goals.

Stubbs joined Rovers this summer from Torquay where he had been leading scorer in each of his six seasons since arriving from Birmingham City.

He started his professional career with West Bromwich, but didn't make their senior side. He switched to Birmingham and got only rare chances there, but he really struck form at Torquay for whom he scored 119 goals in 216 League games.

Rovers' top scorer last season, for the second time in his career, was winger Harold Jarman. A good cricketer, too, Harold plays for Gloucestershire in the summer. He first made Rovers' League team when they were in the Second Division in 1959-60 and now has over 350 League games behind him.

### Bobby Jones on Target

Another man with 350-plus League appearances to his credit - all bar thirty-five of them, when he left for a spell with Northampton and Swindon before returning, were with Rovers - is Bobby Jones who was also on target regularly in their early games.

Ray Graydon first stepped into the side four seasons back but only began to play regularly last season. He opened with three quick goals this term.

Rovers' side comprises largely of home produced players, several of them deriving from their fruitful scouting set-up in South Wales.

Wayne Jones has turned out one of the brightest of the lot from that source. He made his debut three seasons ago and has been a regular for the last two seasons. A former Welsh youth cap, he has since played three times for the under-23s.

Two other Welshmen showing high promise are full-back Phil Roberts who has only this season been introduced to the first team, and half-back Frankie Prince, who has had a dozen or so senior games over the past couple of seasons.

### Summer Signing

Bryn Jones also comes from Wales, though he was a product of Cardiff City's nursery. He didn't make much impact at

Ninian Park, though, and spent a while on loan to Newport County before signing for Rovers in June.

Two Bristol boys who have made good in defence are Lindsay Parsons and Stuart Taylor. The latter has been a fixture for two seasons now, but Parsons only really 'arrived' last term after being in and out of the side for five years.

### From West Brom

Goalkeeper Rick Sheppard arrived during the close-season from West Bromwich. Other summer signings were full-back Tom Stanton, the former Arsenal and Mansfield player, and wing-half Gordon Marsland, who began his career with Blackpool but spent the last four seasons with Carlisle.

Wing-half John Petts learned his game with Arsenal then spent three years with Reading before linking with Rovers in 1965.

Alex Munro has turned out in many positions since Rovers picked him out of Scottish junior soccer in 1962. He was at full-back and wing-half for early games.

### Town's Better Record

Rovers have won only one League game at Kenilworth Road - 2-0 in 1964-65 - over the past forty-eight years. Our League record against them reads:

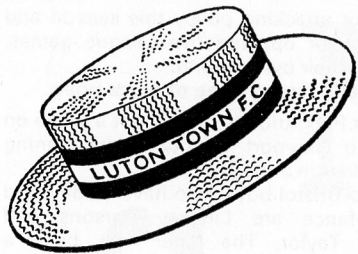
