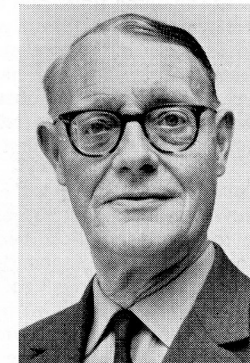

Eric Pugh's Page



While no one would describe Saturday's match with Stockport as a classic, my feeling is that the whole thing has to be viewed in its true perspective against the background of the professional way in which the Town are collecting their points.

That is why I reject the protests of 'Rubbish' which came from a minority faction of the crowd.

Stockport came, as they were quite entitled, to avoid defeat if at all possible. Their tactics were directed mainly towards containing the free-scoring Town attack, as their manager, Walter Galbraith admitted afterwards.

Worked to an extent

'I thought that if we could hold Matt Tees and Graham French we would be in with a chance,' he told me afterwards, and it worked to a certain extent.

Close marking cut down the threat from French and the other winger, John Collins, but Tees, now beginning to establish himself as a danger man, was never subdued.

Division II next season

Partly as a result of his perseverance and the way in which he shrugged off some rough treatment, the Town completed a

run of thirty home League matches without defeat.

Their invincibility at home, combined with their brilliance on opponents' grounds, makes me feel that only a series of major disasters can prevent us seeing Second Division football at Kenilworth Road next season.

End of 'Mid-weeks'

Tonight marks the end of competitive mid-week matches for a matter of seven weeks and there is no doubt that, apart from the success achieved, of which 'phenomenal' is not too high a description, Manager Alec Stock is doubtless pleased that the first team squad has come through with so few injuries.

An exception in this respect is Max Dougan, who faces an anxious few days as he goes through a series of exercises designed to prove whether or not he needs an operation for cartilage trouble.

Can ill afford to lose him

One can only hope that this will be necessary because the club can ill afford to lose an enthusiastic, whole-hearted player like Max for up to two months.

Fortunately, the club are well covered in this position, and his misfortune has given the chance of recall for Freddie Jardine, who has been in the shadows for much of this season.

No spent force

In the second half at Walsall last Tuesday and through the ninety minutes on Saturday, he proved that he is far from a spent force and his return to form will cushion the blow of Dougan's possible protracted absence.

At the same time, one cannot help but feel sympathy for John Ryan, who did not do so badly in the side at the start of the season and who, had he had the good luck to be chosen as substitute at Walsall, would doubtless have taken the opportunity to re-affirm his first team claims.

Luck plays a big part

However, luck plays rather more of a part in football than most people realise and no one is more convinced of this than the players who are involved.

Tonight's game with Bournemouth which presents the Town with their first opportunity to complete a double this season, will be followed by two tough away games.

On Saturday, they are due at Doncaster, last season's Fourth Division champions, who are one of three Yorkshire clubs who are very much in the promotion issue at the moment, the others being Bradford City and Barnsley.

Fine home record

From six home matches, the Rovers have taken eleven points and scored nine goals against two. This could well prove to be the Town's hardest away task yet, but what I feel will be in their favour, is the fact that the Belle Vue pitch is one of the most spacious in the League.

Here, there will be room for manoeuvre and open spaces as the Town break out

quickly from defensive positions which has been a feature of their away displays this season.

Not the same freedom

It could well be that the fact that, apparently, if not in actual fact and measurements, the Kenilworth Road pitch does not give them the same freedom, explains some of the tight corners in which they have found themselves at home.

Not that that has amounted to anything serious, as thirty home League games without defeat indicates, but it does tend to cramp the attacking style.

Clinched promotion there

It could well be a happy omen for the visit to Doncaster that it was on this ground that the Town, a decade ago, clinched their promotion to the First Division by winning 3-0. However, that is all in the past, and the future seems bright enough.

After that, comes the visit to Brighton which, suddenly, after three consecutive defeats by the Seaside, does not look quite so formidable as it might.

No sense of false security

Not that the Town will be lulled into any sense of false security by these results.

Narrow defeats in the space of three days in the north can happen to the best organised teams and when the Bristol Rovers attacking plan really clicks, as it did at Brighton on Saturday, the best teams can capitulate.

So, by the time the Town visit Goldstone Road, I expect that shrewd manager, Freddie Goodwin, to have re-grouped his forces.

No room for doubt

So, I foresee, two very tough tussles, indeed, and if the Town come through both unscathed, then there will be no possible room for doubt about their worthiness to be rated as favourites for the Third Division championship.

Not that, despite Saturday's somewhat damp squib, I feel there is now.

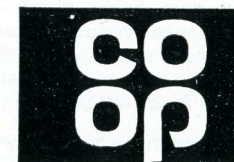

Bournemouth Still On The Lookout For Punch *By Tony Pullein*

A glance at Bournemouth's record quickly reveals why last season's promotion-chasers are deep in relegation trouble.

Before Saturday's game at Southport they had scored eleven League goals, but eight of them came in two matches.

They won 5-1 at Tranmere, drew 3-3 at home to Shrewsbury. They failed to score in six of their remaining nine games.

Yet this is the side that met First Division Sheffield Wednesday in the League Cup, drew 1-1 at Hillsborough then won the replay 1-0! They also whacked Bristol Rovers 3-0 in the knockout tournament.

The Cherries picked up one away point from a 1-1 draw at Brighton but have been beaten on the remainder of their trips to Barnsley (0-1), Bury (0-1) and Reading (0-2).

Looked promising

The loss of last season's top scorer Keith East, through injury, has been partially responsible for their decline though, at first, the new partnership struck up between Ted MacDougall and John Hold looked promising.

Hold, picked up from Hampshire League soccer a few years ago, was Bournemouth's leading marksman two seasons ago and he opened up with six quick goals, including a hat-trick at Tranmere.

MacDougall, the former Manchester United player who had topped York City's scoring list for the past two seasons, weighed in with five. Bournemouth paid York £10,000 for MacDougall during the Summer.

Responsible for making chances

Two other Summer signings have been drafted into the front line, both charged with the responsibility for laying on chances for the strikers.

John Meredith is a winger of considerable experience who kicked off with Doncaster but was snapped up at an early age by Sheffield Wednesday. He moved to Chesterfield in 1962 for a couple of years, then spent the last five campaigns as a regular in Gillingham's side.

Trevor Hartley is a youngster yet to be given his head. He has just left one of the country's finest coaching schools at West Ham United, where his first-team chances were extremely limited, to try to

make a name for himself in League soccer with the Cherries.

Youngsters are ready

Bournemouth's longest-serving player, Ray Bumstead, made his 400th League appearance for them this season but he may not figure strongly in manager Freddie Cox's plans for this season as he was dropped for recent matches.

But there are many fine youngsters ready to step up and take their own chances. Tony Powell and Eddie Rowles are two who may appear in attack. Tony got his chance last season, but Eddie broke through two years ago when he was only 16.

Other discoveries

Three other Bournemouth discoveries – right-back Terry Gulliver and wing-halves Chris Foote and Allan Summerhill – have been playing regularly this season and another, Tommy Naylor, has just returned after injury. Tommy chalked up his 100th League game for the club last season.

Roger Jones is one of the most sought after goalkeepers in the land. Bournemouth were lucky to get him when Portsmouth scrapped their youth teams a few years back and now they could well reap a £40,000 bonus for their good fortune.

That's the price being quoted for this agile England Under 23 'keeper who has been watched by many top clubs.

Jones is naturally ambitious but Bournemouth don't really want to part with him, though like most other Third Division clubs – they could do with the cash!

White is the rock

The rock in the Cherries' defence is Jimmy White, now reaching the veteran stage. He first played in their League side when he was 15, then disappeared to Portsmouth and Gillingham before re-joining the Cherries nine years later in 1966.

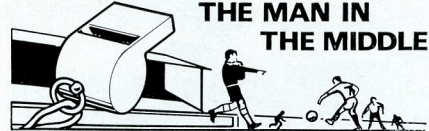

Following the great success of the trip to Plymouth, it was decided at short notice to charter one train for the match at Doncaster next Saturday and bookings so far, indicate that this will be full.

Fare will be £1 5s, and the train leaves at 9.45 a.m, arriving at 1.15 p.m. Departure time from Doncaster is 5.50 p.m and it is due back in Luton at 8.40 p.m.
