FOR MANY years I have been coming to the somewhat austere Rotherham ground, and I cannot recall seeing the pitch so well grassed. Just as well in view of the lack of rain, and there is no doubt that the present hard going is producing more strains and stresses on players than is normal at this stage of the season.

So far the Town were on the receiving end, but they kept breaking into attack, with Tees taking much of the weight. There was a free-kick midway in the Rotherham half, which Bannister placed well, only for Watson to get up above Tees, and from the clearance there was a freekick against Nicholl.

There was a tense moment for Rotherham when Tees was scythed down, and Bannister and French collaborated with the free-kick, French made an accurate centre which Furnell with the utmost difficulty picked off the head of Tees, who would have been a certain scorer if the goalkeeper missed it.

DANGEROUS

When the Town did get on to the attack they were dangerous, and Keith Allen nearly forced the ball past Furnell when Tees headed on a corner from French.

The first 20 minutes were not particularly inspiring, but the Town were obviously doing what they set out to accomplish — containing the opposition.

The next Town attack was sparked off when French cleverly headed inside a rather wild pass by Keen, and this had the effect of giving the Town a corner on the right, and taking some of the pressure off the defence.

From this, taken by French, Allen headed the ball from point blank range and was un-

ing quite vulnerable in defence under pressure.

When play swung to the other end a possible chance was missed by Downes, though admittedly the ball came across sharply.

A couple of sharp raids by the Town were both brought to a premature end by Furnell, first from header by MacDonald, and then following a cross by Ryan who was joining the attack with some effect.

Brilliant work by Tees kept the Town on to the attack, and when he backheeled French was fouled by Mealand, but the winger's finishing was not too accurate yet, and he wasted the free kick.

DEFENSIVE

Basically this was a defensive battle, the Town were fighting, and yet there had been few real threats to their equality. Bannister under pressure was forced to concede a corner from which Davie was impeded, and that was the end of that particular thrust.

Rotherham gained a freekick when Allen brought down Fantham, and the Town brought everyone back. Hudson's kick came over, and Allen handled the ball inside the penalty area, which brought a prompt award of a spot-kick.
