LUTON TOWN

If we could have chosen our opponents from the 79 possibles for today's first round F.A. Cup-tie, Luton Town would have been our last choice. Top of the Third Division, and beaten only twice in 23 League and Cup games this season,

the Hatters provide a formidable obstacle.

They have already won a League game at Dean Court (1.0 on 16th August)—though that certainly doesn't suggest they can repeat the result today—and have since won away games at Gillingham (2.0), Southport (3.0), Plymouth (3.1), Walsall (3.1) and Brighton (2.1) in League games and Millwall (1.0) in the League Cup. They drew at Bradford City (1.1) and Rotherham (1.1) in Third Division games and at Peterborough (1.1) in the League Cup. Their only defeats were at Doncaster (0.2) and Sheffield United (0.3), the latter in the knockout competition.

Luton's away record in the F.A. Cup is far from brilliant, though. They haven't won away from home to a Football League club for over nine years! Their last away triumph was at Huddersfield in 1960—the year after they appeared at Wembley. Luton, in fact, are one of only two post-war F.A. Cup finalists to suffer subsequent relegation to the Third Division — Derby County was the other.

Now that Luton are doing so well in the Third Division, Hatters' fans can talk more rationally of the club's tragic decline since their big day at Wembley. They shot all the way down to the Fourth Division and, only 18 months ago, began the climb out of the basement — merely the first stage, they hope, of a revival which will take them back to the very top.

Some people are arguing that Luton are so intent on gaining promotion that they will not be too worried about making progress in the F.A. Cup. But I wouldn't bank too much on that. Victory is sweet, League or Cup, and success in one competition tends to build confidence for success in others. Anyway, they

played five League Cup-ties before they opted out!

The men we must watch most closely are their three new strikers, Malcolm

MacDonald (from Fulham), John Collins (Reading) — both close-season signings — and Matt Tees, purchased from Charlton in August. MacDonald (10 goals) is top scorer, followed by Collins (7) and Tees (6).

This is the first time we have met Luton in any of the knockout competitions.

The Men behind Luton Town

MANAGER ALEC STOCK

Ex-Charlton and Q.P.R. forward who began his managerial career as Player-Manager of Southern League Yeovil. Apart from a three month period as Assistant Manager of Arsenal, he was in charge at Leyton Orient for eight years, during which time the club gained promotion to Division II. From August to December 1957, Alec was Team Manager of A. S. Roma, before returning to Orient, where he remained until 1959. Perhaps his greatest success was at Q.P.R., where his side won the League Cup and later secured Division I status. He is now in his second season with Luton Town.

COACH JIMMY ANDREWS

A winger with West Ham and Q.P.R. before embarking on a coaching career which has taken him from Q.P.R. (where he was also Team Manager for a short time) to Chelsea, Millwall, Coventry and Luton. Now in his second term as Alec Stock's right-hand man.

COACHING SCHOOL

By Mike Avraamides

THIS WEEK: PENETRATION

Penetration is the ability to get an attacking player in possession of the ball into space behind the opposing defence from which he can make a strike at goal. With the obvious improvements in defensive organisation during recent years, and the consequent reduction in scoring rates, the principle of penetration has become vital to the success of any team — thus the tremendously high prices paid for outstanding strikers in the professional game, on the rare occasions when such players become available for transfer!

It follows, therefore, that every team should spend a great deal of the time available for match preparation in working at methods of penetrating massed, well-drilled defences. In view of this, it is of the utmost importance that practices are made as realistic as possible — the problem cannot be solved adequately merely by improving shooting techniques in the absence of active opposition!

UNDERSTANDING WHAT PENETRATION INVOLVES

- (1) Penetration cannot be divorced from the other principles of attack already discussed — depth, width and mobility, particularly the latter. Decoy running is invaluable for clearing the way for the final penetrating pass to be made, or for the player in possession to break through himself and have a shot at goal.
- (2) Speed and simplicity are vital too, since the fewer the number of passes used, the more likely a team is to penetrate. Long involved midfield build-ups with a great deal of unnecessary square passing give defending players the time they need to organise and concentrate their forces. On the face of it, this appears to suggest that the long ball game is the answer, but that is not the case. Very few players are equipped to hit passes of over 25 yards with the accuracy essential for a high success rate, and it must be remembered that while a ball is travelling distances of this kind, even at speed, defending players are able to cover several yards in order to be on hand for a tackle or an interception.
- (3) Because of the very tight conditions in and around the attacking third of the field, personal qualities like courage and ruthlessness are indispensable. The last third of the field is no place for the poser or the faint-hearted. If players are to penetrate, they must accept the need for boldness as well as skill in the face of uncompromising challenges from defending players. Only then will they be able to turn half-chances into goals and half-chances may be all the opposition allows them!

SANDY DAVIE (Goalkeeper)

Former Scottish Under-23 goalkeeper, for whom Luton paid an £8,000 fee last October, despite the fact that, at the time, he was in Dundee United's reserve team.

JOHN RYAN (Right Back)

Close-season signing from Fulham who gave him a free transfer despite the fact that he appeared 45 times in their League side in the two previous seasons. Started his career with Tonbridge, and moved to Arsenal for a short spell before crossing London to Craven Cottage.

MALCOLM MACDONALD (Left Back)

Another former Fulham player for whom Manager Alec Stock paid £17,500, a stiff fee for a 19-year-old. More than that, Manager Stock surprised the football world by announcing that he would use Macdonald, used mainly by Fulham as a striker, as a full back where he had played for the London club's reserve team.

MIKE KEEN (Right Half)

An £18,500 signing from Q.P.R., with whom he spent ten seasons. More than that, he captained them in their meteoric rise from Division III to Division I and did not miss a match in the process.

ALAN SLOUGH (Centre Half)

This 21-year-old is Luton's most valuable asset now that Bruce Rioch has gone to Aston Villa, but he means to stay with his home town club. Most of his first-team appearances have been made at right half, but Luton intend him for the pivotal job where he played brilliantly last season.

CHRIS NICHOLL (Centre Half)

Chris's transfer was clinched early this season, shortly after he had played a blinder against Luton for Halifax. It is only some 18 months since Chris was playing in non-League football for Witton Albion. Halifax signed him, put him almost immediately into their first-team last season and he stayed for 39 League games in Halifax's first-ever promotion season.

JACK BANNISTER (Left Half)

Was used mostly at left back after his arrival last October from Crystal Palace for an £8,000 fee, and the signing of Macdonald was designed to release him for a midfield role. Vastly experienced, he played in over 100 League games for the Palace and saw previous service with West Bromwich Albion and Scunthorpe.

MATT TEES (Centre Forward)

Matt, signed from Charlton earlier this season, has scored six goals for the Hatters. He first entered English football with Grimsby, who signed him from Airdrie in 1963. He was the Third Division's most prolific scorer in 1965-1966, hitting no fewer than 36 League and Cup goals, form that had Charlton moving in for his signature the following season. He certainly lived up to their expectations for he was their leading goal scorer in both his full seasons at the Valley.

JOHN COLLINS (Outside Right)

John, Reading's top scorer with 17 League goals last season, was one of many close-season signings. He has quickly lived up to his scoring reputation, having found the net seven times this season. He made his League debut with Queen's Park Rangers in 1961-1962, moved to Oldham in 1966, but left for Reading within a year.

GRAHAM FRENCH (Outside Right)

When he was the star of England's Youth team whilst on the books of Shrewsbury Town, he was much sought after by the bigger clubs. However, he went to Swindon Town and then to Watford. His next appearance was with Southern Leaguers, Welling Town, from whom Luton bought him for £5,000.

BRIAN LEWIS (Inside Right)

At £20,000 he was Luton's most costly signing from Coventry City in the summer of 1968 and justified the outlay by scoring 22 League goals last season. Is a real opportunist, yet it was mostly as a wing half that he was used by Coventry, who paid a big fee for him when he moved from Portsmouth. His first professional club was Crystal Palace.

KEITH ALLEN (Centre Forward)

Has filled a variety of positions for Luton and is equally at home either as a midfield link or a striker. Born in the Isle of Wight, he became a professional with Portsmouth and then reached Stockport County via Grimsby Town.

THE MAN IN THE MIDDLE MIKE KERKHOF (Bicester)

MIKE KERKHOF makes his second visit of the season to Dean Court this afternoon. A sergeant-major physical training instructor, Mr. Kerkhof's progress towards promotion to the Football League referee's list last season was not as straightforward as some of his colleagues, for overseas' postings have sometimes interrupted his refereeing career.

Mr. Kerkhof became a referee by accident. He might have become a star player but the First Division club, with whom he was playing, advised him to

have a knee operation. He refused and left the game for a while.

Then, by chance, he was asked to referee a local cup final. "I wasn't a trained referee then but, because I was fit, they had confidence in me," he recalls. "I suppose I did quite well and was asked to take up refereeing properly."

Mr. Kerkhof, a Lancashire man, went up the scale — between postings — through the Warrington and District League, the Hellenic League and the Football Combination. He was appointed a Football League linesman three years ago. Fortunately, he is not likely to be posted abroad again, so he can concentrate more fully on his refereeing career.
