While in view of two vitally important promotion battles looming up, the Town, doubtless, could have done without the complication of an additional match tonight, at the same time, they must be glad to have a second crack at Bournemouth.

So easily could they have slipped out of this season's FA Cup competition in undistinguished fashion at Dean Court on Saturday.

However, in the end, through discipline in defence, they hung on to a draw and thus, these two teams meet tonight for the fourth time this season.

#### Odds on the Town

Score so far is one victory for the Town and two draws and the odds seem on Luton going one better than the goalless draw to which they were held on this ground at the beginning of October and qualifying for the second round.

At this range, it was by no means certain that the injury position would allow Manager Alec Stock to choose the team he envisaged for the replay.

#### Have run into trouble

After a fairly fortunate spell during the crowded early weeks of the season, the Town have run into injury trouble and they were waiting for the results of fitness tests on Chris Nicholl and Mike Harrison, neither of whom could be considered for the trip to Bournemouth.

Definitely out was Brian Lewis, who has his left foot in plaster as the result of a weight dropping on it and breaking one bone and cracking another.

#### Unlucky spell for Lewis

It has been a most unlucky season for Lewis and this latest mishap has come at a



time when he must have been on the verge of recall to the first team.

Bournemouth, of course, have earned, over the years, a considerable reputation as Cup-fighters and they will not yield easily.

As we saw on their earlier visit, their defence is solid and well drilled and the Town's problem tonight will be to find their way through it often enough to secure the goals that matter.

#### More goal power will be welcome

There is no doubt that some sign of increased goal power will be welcome tonight, especially as the Town's last four matches have ended in 1-1 draws.

That rather suggests that, somewhere along the way, they have mislaid their goal touch. Especially is it necessary that they should regain their confidence in front of goal in view of the vast importance of the next two matches.

#### Surprise packet

On Saturday, newly promoted Rochdale, one of the surprise packets of the Third Division this season in that their attacking style has taken them among the leading promotion contenders, are the visitors.

Despite their Cup defeat at Workington on Saturday, they have an away record that almost compares with that of the Town, having won six of their games on opponents' grounds and lost only two.

On this evidence, this should be a most interesting clash and one which the Town cannot afford to do other than win.

Past evidence points that way because Rochdale's three previous visits to Kenilworth Road have all ended in defeat by 4-1, 3-1 and 4-1.

#### Fulham attraction

In a lower position in the League table, but probably a greater attraction than the Lancashire side, are Fulham, who will be here a week tonight.

Before the season began, it was thought that Fulham who slipped ignominiously from the First to the Third Division, would have that additional touch of class to put them among the top flight.

However, they have not found things going their way so much as they had hoped and, despite some spectacular results, including an 8-0 win at Halifax, they have managed to average no more than a point a match and it will need a tremendous effort from them to become

in contention for promotion this season.

#### Unexpected Setback

To add to their troubles, they were unexpectedly dismissed from the Cup at Exeter on Saturday, a happening that will not have done their confidence much good.

At the same time, they have players like the famous Johnny Haynes to enable them to rise to the occasion and, for this reason, this will be one match which the Town will have to approach with caution.

A resounding victory tonight would do much towards building up the Town's confidence for the task ahead and, after three consecutive home League draws and four out of the last five, they badly need the tonic of victory.

#### Could regain clear lead

Four points from these two matches should enable them to re-establish their clear lead in Division III and would be a great fillip to their hopes of Division II football next season.

After these meetings, there is only the visit to Mansfield in the League before what the club will be hoping will be active participation in the second round of the FA Cup on 6 December.

#### 'Review' back on Saturday

In view of the short notice at which tonight's match had to be arranged, it has been impossible to include a copy of the *Football League Review* in this programme, but it will appear as usual in the issues for the Rochdale and Fulham games.

It is recorded elsewhere in this issue that the club has been awarded the John White award for best behaviour by their supporters over the latest period under review.

This is the first time Luton have received this accolade which has come their way mainly through the smooth working of their chartered train plan.

From personal experience, I can say that this has worked wonderfully well and that the support at away matches has been little less than remarkable.

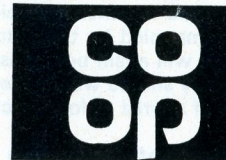

## Attendants wanted for car park

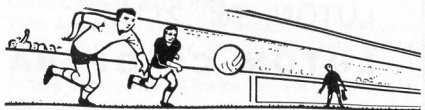

## Cup fighting Cherries forget League worries

There's nothing like a cup-tie to bring the best out of Bournemouth. Since they careered into the FA Cup quarter-finals 13 years ago – beating Wolves and Spurs, third and second in the First Division, on the way – they have been feared by all opponents.

This season, in spite of their exceptionally poor League form, they defeated First Division Sheffield Wednesday 1–0 in the League Cup, after drawing at Hillsbrough.

So we must treat them with due respect this evening. After all, they did hold us to a goalless draw here in a League game last month, so they will certainly be no push-over.

### Can't get among the goals

Defensively, the Cherries are reasonably sound. But their forwards just can't seem to get among the goals. Leading scorer, with eight, is Ted MacDougall, the former Manchester United player who had topped York City's scoring list for the past two seasons. Bournemouth paid York £10,000 for him during the summer.

Back after injury, Keith East – last season's chief marksman – has been doing his best to liven things up but hasn't had a lot of success. Maybe the Cup will rouse him, too?

He once scored four goals in an FA Cup-tie for Swindon – then hit five in a League game the following Saturday! Keith started with Portsmouth, serving Swindon and Stockport on his way to Dean Court.

### Started with a hat-trick

John Hold, picked up from Hampshire League soccer a few years ago, was Bournemouth's leading marksman two seasons ago and started well this term with a hat-trick at Tranmere. He has seven goals to date.

Outside-left John Meredith joined Bournemouth from Gillingham during the close season. Doncaster, his first club, lost him to Sheffield Wednesday at an early age but he didn't quite hit it off at Hillsbrough, so he joined Chesterfield in 1962.

Three years later he signed for Gillingham, holding a regular place in their side for five years. Trevor Hartley joined the Cherries this summer from West Ham, where his first-team opportunities were rare.

### 'Failed' at 17 years old!

Seventeen-year-old Mel Simmonds achieved his ambition to play League football this season after failing – if that is an apt description for one still so young! – at Manchester United and Reading.

United released him from his apprenticeship last season and he joined Reading in a similar capacity until signing professional in January. He was freed at the end of the season. Eddie Rowles was only 16 when he made Bournemouth's senior side two seasons ago.

### In 'A' team only three weeks ago

Three weeks ago Kieron Baker was playing in Bournemouth's 'A' team. Then Kim Book moved to Northampton and England under-23 'keeper Roger Jones damaged his hand in training so Baker – who has played only ten reserve team games so far – was thrown in for a vital match at Orient.

Several other locally-developed players appear in defence. Tony Powell and Chris Foote both got their chance in the League eleven last season, but Terry Gulliver, who was spotted with Southern League Weymouth, has been holding down his place at full-back for three years.

### Back where he started

Jimmy White first played for the senior side at centre-forward when he was 15 in 1958. Soon after that he moved to Portsmouth but he made little more than thirty appearances over five years at Fratton Park.

He won a regular place at Gillingham where he spent three seasons before returning to his original club in 1966.

Ralph Miller and David Stocks both opened their League careers with Charlton and put in spells with Gillingham before linking with the Cherries.

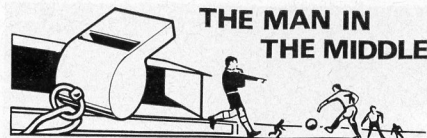

### MIKE KERKHOF (Bicester)

We must get on parade sharp this evening. For today's referee is MIKE KERKHOF, a sergeant-major physical training instructor.

His progress towards promotion to the Football League referee's list last season was not so straightforward as some of his colleagues, for overseas postings have sometimes interrupted his refereeing career.

### In charge in many countries

'But I've been lucky in many respects', he admits. 'With the army I have refereed in many countries, including Egypt, Palestine, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey, Holland and France.

'In 1967 and 1968 I took the Kentish Cup final between France and Belgium. I think I'm probably the first referee to get that honour two years in succession.'

Last season he officiated at the European Cup tie between Rosenburg Trondheim (Norway) and Rapid Vienna.

Mr Kerkhof became a referee by accident. He might have become a star player but the First Division club, with whom he was playing, advised him to have a knee operation. He refused and left the game for a while.

### Decision came by chance

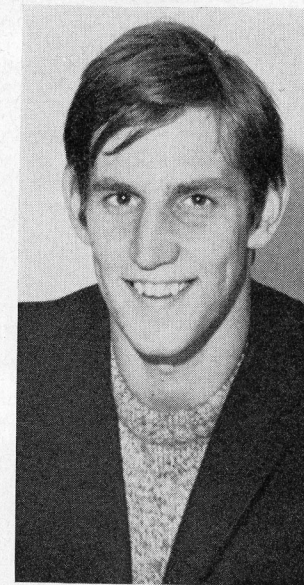
Then by chance, he was asked to referee a local cup final. 'I wasn't a trained referee then but, because I was fit, they had confidence in me,' he recalls. 'I suppose I did quite well and was asked to take up refereeing properly.'

Mr Kerkhof, a Lancashire man, went up the scale — between postings — through the Warrington & District League, the Hellenic League and the Football Combination.

He was appointed a Football League linesman three years ago.

Fortunately, he is not likely to be posted abroad again so he can concentrate more fully on his refereeing career.

When the Town signed Chris from Halifax Town the day after he had been instrumental in depriving them of a home point on 26 August, they paid out a record fee for the club of £30,000.

This contrasted sharply with the modest £750 the Halifax manager, Alan Ball, had paid for his transfer from Cheshire club, Witton Albion only about 12 months before.

However, once in regular League football, Chris developed quickly and came to be regarded last season as the best centre-half in Division IV.

Was born at Macclesfield and had a trial with Burnley who, however, could not see any future for him in the big time and allowed him to go.

Since he has come to Kenilworth Road, he has become highly popular with the crowd and he soon settled down to a spell of consistent form.

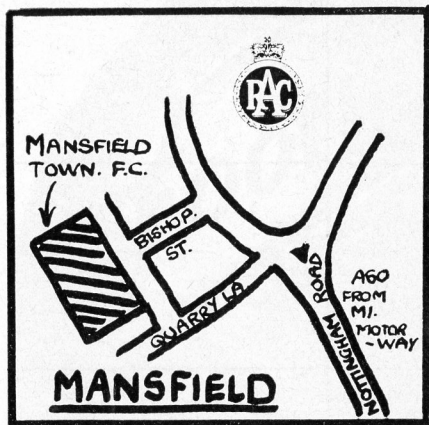
