PROMOTION rivals Bradford City were caught on the rebound as Luton Town shook off the memory of last week's nightmare defeat at Hillingdon with a championship style 5-0

Three goal Macdonald, Tees and Collins were the destroyers of Bradford, the last side to win at Kenilworth Road — twenty months ago.

But disappointingly only 11,857 saw this fine top-ofthe-table clash.

A mixture of Christmas shopping and Hillingdon blues kept the crowd below normal size at Kenilworth Road for this top-of-the-table meeting.

A fair contingent of Bradford fans had travelled down from Yorkshire and before the start they taunted Luton fans by chanting "Hillingdon".

The Town fielded what is the flown fielded what is currently regarded as their strongestside, the only change from last week being a swop of shirts between Macdonald and Collins.

The Luton substitute was Peter Phillips.

Tough

This was regarded as a match of vital importance to Luton. After it they have tough away fixtures at Bristol Rovers and the Orient. It is one they badly wanted to win after sliding out of the FA Cup last week.

Bradford City were the last team to beat Luton at home— in April 1968. They won that one 3-1.

The Town got away to a spirited start with a bright-looking attack from Tees, Macdonald and Collins. Collins twice managed to get a shot in from inside the box but both times they were blocked.

From a French corner in the rom a French corner in the second minute, Macdonald, Collins, and, finally, Bannister strived hard and Bannister's shot was deflected narrowly wide of a post. From the second corner Collins blasted over the bar.

But the Town centre forward could not quite reach it and an open-goal situation was wasted as the ball ran over the by-line for a goal kick
