WITHOUT going through the formality of a fitness test, Jack Bannister was this morning ruled out of the reckoning for the Town team at Torquay.

While his injury, a bruised instep, received in mysterious circumstances against Chelsea Reserves is not serious, and he should be fit for next Saturday, hopes of a much quicker recovery, were obviously slightly over optimistic.
