Since the turn of the year, we have been singularly short of League matches at Kenilworth Road, which has neither served to help the promotion bid, nor assisted in the swelling of the coffers.

So, on both counts, the Town will be glad of the chance to stage two home games in the space of four days, the first coming today against Brighton whose highly consistent run has hoisted them among the promotion challengers.

Have emerged as a live force

Shrewd re-building by their manager, Freddie Goodwin, erstwhile Manchester United 'babe' as an up-and-coming wing-half, and an ex-Lancashire fast bowler, who lived much in the shadow of Brian Statham, Brighton have emerged as a live force in the Third Division.

Before their clash with Walsall on Wednesday on what amounted to the neutral territory of The Hawthorns, West Bromwich, because of the waterlogged state of the Walsall ground, they had gone twelve matches without defeat and turned what had seemed to be a forlorn hope of

promotion into something approaching reality.

Urgent need for Town to regain form

Obviously, they are now a more positive outfit than the one the Town beat 2-1 at the Goldstone ground way back in October and this is one which Luton just have to win.

The urgency has been brought about by failures over a period which have seen them acquire a mere six points out of twenty at stake which is in remarkable opposition to the consistency with which they were operating before Christmas.

Various theories have been advanced
Various theories have been advanced for the falling away. Some point to the psychological effect of the way in which they were bundled out of the FA Cup by non-League club, Hillingdon Borough.

Yet, they would seem to have given the lie to that by thrashing Bradford City 5-0 the following week.

Then, doubts were expressed about whether the players had fully recovered from the effects of the flu bug which caused them to have two matches postponed around the New Year.

Purple patch followed by a crash

Certainly, there were four consecutive defeats, two of them at home, to give force to that theory. Then, doubts were forgotten in a purple patch which brought victory at Bury, a draw at Stockport and a resounding 4-0 win at home against Doncaster.

Most people thought the Town were on their way again and looked forward to at least half the spoils from three consecutive away matches.

However, disillusionment was to come, first at Bristol where a 3-0 defeat was their portion in a match marked by controversial decisions though I, for one, would not quarrel with the justice of the final result.

How wrong we were proved

Never mind, we thought, the team will be on the winning track again at Barrow, but how wrong we were! Yet, everything worked in the Town's favour.

They took the lead at a critical period early in the second half, but then found themselves hit by two quick goals from Barrow and came away from the then bottom team's headquarters very much with their tails between their legs.

Team had come to the crossroads

After that, it scarcely needed the pointed remarks of Manager Alec Stock for one to realise that the team had come very much to the crossroads and, sure enough, there were far reaching changes at Torquay last Saturday.

In the originally selected line-up out went the middle three of Mike Keen, John Collins and Keith Allen though, in the event, Keen remained in the team when

Bannister could not play because of a bruised instep.

Went back to two orthodox wingers

Not only was there a change of personnel, but an alteration in tactics, too, with two orthodox wingers being employed - something that has been a rarity even in home games this season.

There have been complaints over a period that the Town have been too slavish in their methods, almost neglecting one half of the way as a vehicle for attack, but this was remedied at Torquay.

In that two goals were scored and they were only four minutes from victory, this could be said to have succeeded and there can be no doubt that these tactics will be repeated this afternoon.

Facing a period of tremendous pressure

Beginning with today's match from which two points are absolutely necessary, if there is to be a chance of promotion at the end of the story, the Town face a period of tremendous pressure.

On Tuesday, Tranmere Rovers, who have been badly hit by injuries and are struggling against the spectre of relegation, are here, and then come away games next Saturday and on Wednesday week against other promotion contenders, Rochdale and Reading.

Reading have the greater resiliency

Probably, the former have not the resiliency to fight the fight to the end, but Reading have the greater resources and may, along with Orient, prove to be the chief barrier to the Town's advancement to Division II.

Not only have they to meet them at Elm Park, but Reading have to come to Kenilworth Road - on Easter Saturday - and, if the position remains reasonably unchanged, there could be a tremendous crowd for this meeting.

We hope it is a happy augury that it was at Mansfield last season that Watford, in their last match, made absolutely certain of gaining Second Division status.

After the scarcity of home matches there has been recently, another one here on Tuesday night against Tranmere Rovers (7.30), is a welcome sight and, naturally, we are hoping for big crowds at both games and four points to give a boost to our promotion hopes.

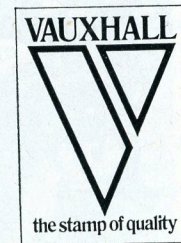

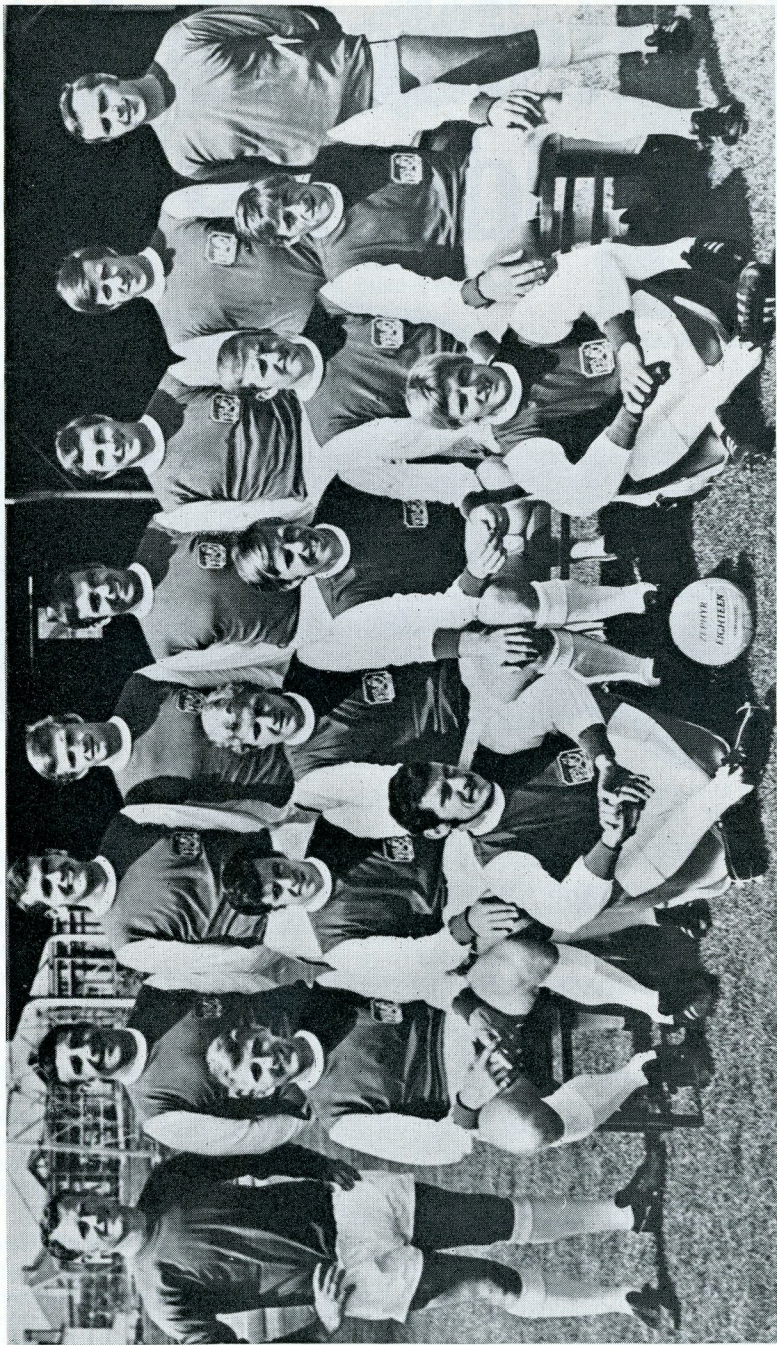

Confident Brighton are pushing for promotion

A run of twelve League games without defeat made Brighton one of our strongest promotion rivals and one of the most difficult sides to beat — they've conceded only two goals in the eleven League games before their meeting with Walsall on Wednesday.

Small wonder the Brighton rearguard is so sound when it includes international players of the calibre of John Napier and Willie Bell.

Napier developed in Bolton's junior sides, rose to their League team in 1964/5 and was selected for the Northern Ireland under-23 side before gaining a full cap against West Germany in 1965-66. He is now in his third season with Brighton.

Six seasons with Leeds

Bell entered English football with Leeds United, joining them from Queen's Park, the famous Scottish amateur club.

Willie enjoyed six highly successful campaigns in Leeds' first-team, winning two full Scottish caps, prior to his move to Leicester in 1967. Brighton signed him during the summer close-down last year.

Came back from the States

Goalkeeper Geoff Sidebottom started with Wolves but came into his own after moving to Aston Villa in 1961. Four years later he joined Scunthorpe, then had a spell in the United States before linking with Brighton last year.

Full-back Stewart Henderson had excellent grounding with the Chelsea youth set up but never got into the first team at Stamford Bridge. Brighton gave him his chance in 1965-66 and now he is performing consistently well for them at right-back. Norman Gall was signed from Gateshead and made his League debut for Brighton in 1962-63, since when he has made over 250 first team appearances.

Turner — loyal servant

No player has given Brighton more loyal service over the past six years than wing-half David Turner. He may have had reservations about leaving Newcastle United in 1964 to join a club then floundering in Division Four.

However, they were quickly dispelled as he settled into the team which won promotion at the end of his first season.

He has remained first choice ever since.

Eddie Spearritt kicked off his professional career with Ipswich Town, making the first team in 1965-66. Unfortunately, he couldn't quite break into the side regularly and had to await his transfer to Brighton last season before enjoying a long run in League football.

Gilliver is out of the side

Brighton's level-top scorer Allan Gilliver (12 goals) is out of the side at the moment but Alex Dawson, another famous striker, is grabbing goals regularly.

Dawson was Manchester United's outside-left in the 1958 FA Cup final, then returned to Wembley in 1964 as Preston's centre-forward. He moved to Preston in 1961 when he was no longer guaranteed a first-team place at Old Trafford and he was Preston's leading marksman in four of his five seasons at Deepdale. He had a couple of years with Bury, without really recapturing his best form, but he regained all his old sparkle after signing for Brighton last season, when he finished top scorer with seventeen goals in twenty-three League games. He has also scored twelve this term.

Kit Napier — Danger Man

Yet another danger man is Kit Napier, the former Preston, Workington and Newcastle player, who has nine goals so far.

The man prompting many of Brighton's attacks is Nobby Lawton, a mid-field man of considerable reputation and experience.

One of his finest games was for Preston in the 1964 FA Cup Final, the best of some 150 matches for the Deepdale club which he had joined from Manchester United in 1962. Brighton signed him three years ago.

Brighton's latest signing is Alan Duffy, who arrived from Newcastle United last month. One of many stars developed on Tyneside, he had had few opportunities in the Magpies' senior team.

Bobby Smith didn't make the first team at Manchester United, but established

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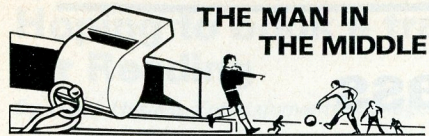

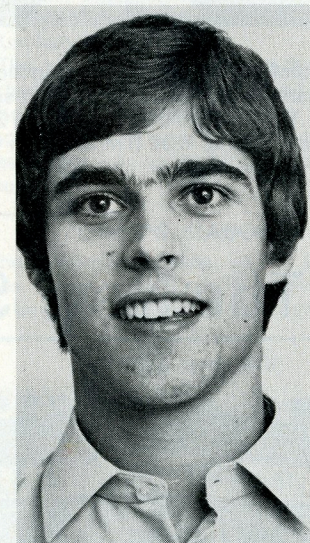
20 VIV BUSBY

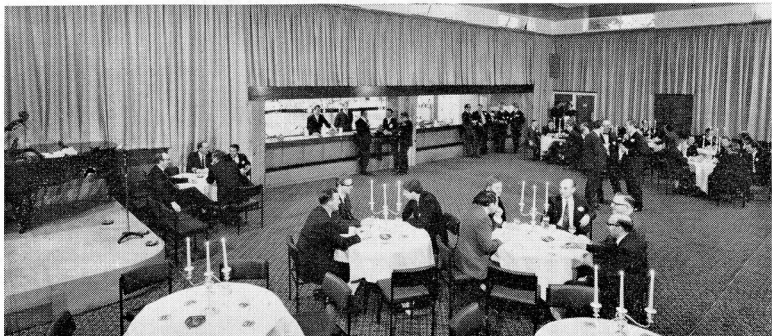
himself following a transfer to Scunthorpe in 1964. Three years later he shifted to Grimsby where he remained until signing for Brighton during the 1968 close-season.

While arrangements have already been finalised for a specially chartered train to go to Rochdale next Saturday, and times are given below, there may be even more interest by supporters in the shorter journey to Reading.

This takes place on Wednesday week (kick-off 7.30) for a match that holds a vital look for the promotion prospects of both clubs.

Will give nearly all a chance

I am trying to arrange for a train to go there, envisaging it leaving Luton in the region of 5.15 or 5.20 p m which would give almost everyone who wants to see this game, a chance to get there in time.

At the moment, neither the times nor the fare which we shall be able to quote, have been finalised, but I hope to be able to give full details in next Tuesday's programme and also in the local Press.

Fare to Rochdale is only 22s 6d

For Rochdale, the train will leave Luton at 8.45 a m, arriving Bedford 9.04 and Rochdale, 12.50 p m.

The return journey begins at 5.47 p m, arriving Bedford 9.40 and Luton, 10 o'clock. The fare is what we consider to be a very reasonable £1 2s 6d.

It was regretted that it was necessary to cancel the train scheduled for the trip to Barrow, but the weather was all against this one and, apart from that, the advance bookings did not suggest that this would be an economic venture.

Cannot be subsidised

While the aim is to provide travel as cheaply as possible for the average fan, it must be understood that the Football Club cannot be expected to subsidise the journeys.
