



With the postponement of the Fulham and Southport matches we must hope that the weather has improved enough to allow tonights home game against Luton to be played.

Many people in Reading are eagerly discussing the possibility (and some even the probability) of promotion this season. Our last home performance against Rochdale was very disappointing for them even though the end result was in our favour. Frustration at crowd and player level set in for fairly long periods and our standard of play was nothing like as high as in previous matches. However, one must accept that as the season progressed and our successful run continued, we have rapidly become a leading contender. We are now obviously bracketed among the "teams to beat", and our opponents, whatever their own league position, will be raising their game at Elm Park.

They need your backing. I have heard our few hundred away supporters give more encouragement to the team than was heard for long spells on Saturday. Our slower style of build up is not so conducive to excitement as the longer pass for forwards to chase, but we nevertheless need to feel that you are for us. Come on you "under the clock boys" see if you can start the ball rolling!!

On a last and very concerned note, may I point out to the very few unthinking people who first cheer and then jeer at injured players, they are not all shamming, as was so unfortunately shown against Rochdale.



LUTON began the season as red-hot favourites for promotion—and until Christmas they did little to dampen anyone's belief in their ability to reach Division Two at a canter.

But on Boxing Day Alec Stock's men were beaten at Orient, and the following day they surrendered their long, long unbeaten home record—36 games—to Gillingham.

Since then Luton have gone through a difficult spell, and have found points hard to come by. Teams like ourselves, Brighton, Orient and Bristol Rovers went by them. In fact when Brighton went to Kenilworth Road and took a point recently some papers were rash enough to say that it spelled the end of Luton's promotion hopes—but, of course, this view is totally premature, and there is no doubt that Luton are still a top class side.

The arrival of Alec Stock a year or so ago injected consistency into them,

and they were unlucky, really, not to go up last season.

One of the men he bought, of course, was Reading's John Collins. Our leading scorer last season, John switched from Elm Park to Kenilworth Road for a five-figure cheque.

Another player bought was Fulham's Malcolm McDonald. Again a five-figure fee was involved, but both Collins and McDonald have proved well worth the investment, both figuring prominently in the scoring charts.

Another investment was a reputed £30,000 for Halifax centre-half Chris Nicholl, who was attracting the big clubs with his solid and powerful play.

The defence around him is founded on experience, and few players in the Third Division can match **Mike Keen** on that score. Leader of the successful Queen's Park Rangers team in Mr. Stock's days there.

John Ryan came from Fulham in the Summer, Alan Slough has been with Luton for some years, while Jack Bannister was formerly with Crystal Palace. Goalkeeper Sandy Davie moved down from Scotland at the start of last season and quickly made his mark this side of the border.

Alongside Collins and McDonald up front Luton have a spectacular front runner in **Graham French**. Formerly with Shrewsbury and Swindon, the burly French emerged from a spell in the doldrums to display the sort of form which earned him rave notices in his younger days.


Matt Tees was signed in the Autumn from Charlton, while Mike Harrison has had experience with Blackburn and Portsmouth.
