SURPRISINGLY at Luton last night, Bury proved to be strongest in the department that is regarded as their weak spot—their defence—although they were indebted

to the benevolence of the Luton forwards.

In fact it needed the good judgment of Ramsbottom to rescue Bury on several occasions, but his task was made the easier by the inaccuracy of the Luton
