Holiday periods present their own peculiar difficulties, especially when there are two consecutive home games and one has to consider the implications of the second before knowing the result of the first.

In this case, this is important because, unless there was a win of a clear-cut nature yesterday, promotion hopes as the Town face other contenders Reading, this afternoon, are very slim indeed.



Brighton were looking jaded

Not being clairvoyant, and these notes having to be written early in the week, I am certainly in no position to consider what effect the results of yesterday's games had on the issue at the top of the table.

Suffice it to say this that Reading faced a tough assignment at Brighton who were said to have looked so jaded during their narrow win against Southport on Saturday, that a projected trip to the Isle of Wight was cancelled.

Reading committed to all-out attack Instead, they were ordered to take three

Instead, they were ordered to take three days break from training and to use the brine baths which are situated down the road from their Goldstone Road ground.

Reading, to their eternal credit, got into the promotion race committed to a policy of all-out attack, and the fact that they were dismissed from the FA Cup by Southern Leaguers, Brentwood, seemed to steel their ambition to make a show in the League.

Town broke the Reading spell

This they have certainly done during these last months and, when the Town beat them by a goal 30 seconds from the end at Elm Park a fortnight ago, it was their first setback for fifteen matches.

Apparently, that also broke the spell because after making a partial recovery with a 1-1 draw at Halifax, they beat Barrow 6-3 after being 5-0 up and then, amazingly, crashed 4-0 before their own supporters to Fulham last Saturday.

Mansell is not changing policy

Their manager, Jack Mansell, who almost completely rebuilt the team after taking over from Roy Bentley, is not shaken out of his belief that attack is the best form of defence.

'We are not changing our attacking policy,' he said after Saturday's debacle and, while that is laudable, it could well have come to grief yesterday and, if the Town can only show their fans something of their best form, could do so this after-

Plenty of room for venturous policy

At the same time, there is plenty of room in football, especially in these days of super safety tactics for managers with Mansell's adventurous policy.

Maybe, tactics of this sort will not bring honours in the end, but they will certainly earn friends and you cannot have too many of them in this game.

Reading, I am assured, will bring a tremendous following, which could add up to the Town's biggest home League gate of the season.

Figures might have topped 20,000

Naturally enough, in view of the fickle nature of a section of the football public, this will depend to a certain extent on the result of yesterday's match, and on the combination of results affecting the promotion issue.

Had the Town won their last two home matches convincingly, as they should have done and had not Reading slipped so badly from grace before their own fans, then I would have been confident in predicting an attendance of over 20,000 for what is, in effect, almost a local derby.

Rest day for Town on Monday

Now, I am not so sure and it is more probable that the figures will fall well short of what has been an unattainable figure for the Town this season.

Monday is a rest day for the Town, for which they will no doubt be glad, but they certainly face a tough task on Tuesday when they face Barnsley at Oakwell.

Barnsley have been on the fringe

This is a ground on which they have had somewhat mixed fortune in the past. For much of the season, Barnsley have been on the fringe of the promotion fight.

Before the holiday began, it looked as if they had too much to do to get back into it, in that they had only six matches left to play.

However, theirs has been a brave bid, they have an extremely useful team, assembled by their long-serving manager, Johnny Steele, and the Town will do extremely well to return with some reward.

Back in Yorkshire again on Saturday

Next Saturday brings another trip to Yorkshire to meet Halifax, the team managed by Alan Ball, father of the England star, and the club to whom the Town paid £30,000 for Chris Nicholl at the start of the season.





Jack Mansell re-built Reading almost overnight By Tony Pullein

A magnificent run of fifteen unbeaten League games – ending when we won 1–0 at Elm Park just over a fortnight ago – lifted Reading from the depths of the Third Division into the League leadership.

Though they have since lost some ground, the Biscuitmen still believe they can make the top two.

It's doubtful if any manager has achieved such rapid success, using such unorthodox methods, as Reading's Jack Mansell.

He took over the Elm Park hot seat at the end of last season when Reading were struggling well down the table.

And he brought about this remarkable transformation with methods which most of his contemporaries felt were tantamount to managerial suicide.

Assembled new team almost overnight

He quickly decided he would scrap virtually the entire first team – and start building again from scratch!

Whereas most newly-appointed managers prefer to step cautiously through their initial few months, Mansell staked his reputation on being able to assemble a new team almost overnight.

Consequently, the team we are likely to see today contains only one of last season's regulars, Dennis Allen.

'By present Reading standards he's a real old stager for he's been with the club since arriving from Charlton in June 1961, since when he has completed over 300 League games for the Biscuitmen.

Originally a striker – he twice led their scorers – he later assumed a deeper role and, this season, has been appearing in defence.

Top scorers were at Rotherham

Their chief strikers are Les Chappell and Bobby Williams who have hit some thirty goals between them.

Chappell, a Rotherham discovery, led the Millers' scoring list in 1966–67 but left for Blackburn, where he spent an unhappy campaign last season, before signing for Reading last July.

Williams started his career with Bristol City, hitting seventy-five goals in 188 League games for them before signing for Rotherham in 1965.

Unfortunately, he couldn't quite capture his old shooting form there so, after

a couple of years, he returned to Bristol, this time to join Rovers. He joined Reading in August.

Late signing from Hartlepool

Shortly before this season's transfer deadline, Reading signed Hartlepool's leading scorer (fifteen goals this season) Terry Bell to boost the attack.

Terry joined Hartlepool from Nuneaton four years ago and was top scorer with fourteen League goals in their 1967–68 Fourth Division promotion campaign.

Brothers Tony and Barry Wagstaff joined the club last July from Sheffield United. Tony made his debut for the Blades in 1960–61 and was a regular member of this senior side until dropping out two years ago.

Barry reached the Blades' League eleven in 1964–65 and completed a century of senior games for them before his move.

Habbin came out of Southern League

Neither of the remaining contenders for attacking positions had played League football prior to this season, Dick Habbin joining them from Southern League Cambridge United. He hit his first hattrick against Barrow last week.

Gordon Cumming spent five years with Arsenal, joining them from Glasgow United, but didn't manage to make the Gunners' senior team.

Another ex-Arsenal man who didn't get a senior chance was right-back Wilf Dixon. He had been connected with Highbury since his school days, signing first on associated schoolboy forms then as an apprentice and, in May 1968, as a full-timer.

Learned his game with Tottenham

Freddie Sharpe learned his game with Spurs but rarely got into the first team. After joining Norwich in 1963 he settled



When he talks of his early days with the Southern League club, he recalls with great relish those famous Cup victories on the Somerset club's sloping ground over Bury and Sunderland.


Enthusiasm in the small town in those days knew no bounds and there is no doubt that those Cup successes boosted Stock's chances of taking over a League club.
