LUTON never looked like a side fighting for promotion to the Second Division. A poor first half display brought little improvement after the interval and an injury-hit Halifax side had no trouble in containing the punchless Luton attack.

One bright spot was some assured defending but up front only Macdonald showed any fire. Slough and Busby gave good support and Mike Keen was an able general, but this just was not the sort of form that deserves a higher grade of football.

With Graham French not fully fit Mike Harrison continued on the left wing for Luton. Peter Phillips was named as substitute.

The Halifax team was far from settled and manager Alan Ball, father of the England forward, told me-before the start. "I just don't know how we got a team out. I only have 15 professionals and almost half of those are injured. Some of the injured have just had to turn out today."

He was forced to make seven changes in the Halifax team.

Today we have got to go forward. We have to win. It's a matter of going all out for both points and I have instructed the team to this effect.

A first minute free kick by Shawcross gave Halifax an early advantage and with the ball footbing about in the box they 'namediately' flooked dangerous until Chadwick ran the ball too far and it went out of play to give Luton the relief of a goal kick.
