CONFIDENTLY and competently, the Town edged a step nearer to their promotion ambition when they comfortably overcame Walsall before a crowd of 17,193 at Kenilworth Road on Saturday night.

Probably, their victory would have been even more conclusive but for the fact

that some caution was necessary when they lost Starling through injury after 58 minutes.

This led to the introduction of the substitute, Keith Allen, in goal, which I understand is a com-pletely new experience for him. Yet, the confident way in which he handled the ball did not suggest that, and the crowd applauded gleefully every time he made a successful catch.


At the same time, the defence did not take anything for granted because they afforded him the maximum cover, with the result that only in the dying minutes when Evans drove the ball against a post, was he in any sort of trouble.

Winning lead Fortunately, when the mishap to Starling

occurred—he damaged the ligaments of his knee when getting up after saving a low shot—the Town already held a winning lead of 3-0. All the goals came in the first half when the

Town established their superiority without any argument.

BUSBY set the pattern with a well-taken goal after eight minutes, and COLLINS followed with another 17 minutes later. Most of the damage to Walsall's defence came down the Town's left where,
