LUTON TOWN fired the imagination as they fought a cut and thrust duel of excitement with First Division Forest, at Kenilworth Road last night. In the end they gave it away, but anyone who saw this FA Cup third round replay will remember it for a long, long time.

A Macdonald hat-trick put Luton on the brink of a Cup run which they would have hoped to extend against Orient. But, strangely, it was defensive mistakes which put them out.

"We gave goals away tonight," said manager Alec Stock. "I have no time for excuses or hard luck stories

Matching Forest's initial burst chase for chase, Luton set the crowd roaring early on. And they never stopped. Never have I heard a set of fans so behind a team.

Twice Hoy was foiled by Barron who took one full-blooded drive on the chin without seeing it.

Strangely Luton were never ahead. They fell into the trap of pushing forward too eagerly and leaving their rearguard exposed. You can't do that against the First Division.

### Bemused

Even so, Luton lost no friends by playing it this way. It was a match of high speed thrust and parry, with Luton doing most of the thrusting. It was a night to remember.

Said coach Jimmy Andrews: "We over-attacked. It was a great game for spectators, but not a great professional game. At times we were murdering them.

"We played well enough to win and badly enough to lose. Attacking football is great if you are not too worried about the result," he said.
