A JITTERY DEFENCE SINKS TOWN

LATE LAST NIGHT, after mulling over Luton's unfortunate defeat at Ashton Gate yesterday, Town manager Alec Stock indicated that he was changing Luton's line-up for today's game at Millwall.

But he did not write off the Town's now slender chance of promotion. "There are still matches to play. We'll talk about that in a fortnight," he told me.

So today it looked as if £35,000 David Court and £20,000 Roger Hoy would be given another chance. "I think we shall go back to the old 4-3-3 formation," he said. But Mr Stock was not naming his side until shortly before this afternoon's kick-off at The Den.

What went wrong at Bristol then? Just about everything. At half-time Luton had the points sewn up with a comfortable two-goal lead.

But a defence that had as many holes as a ten-year-old Gruyere mucked the whole thing up in the second half.

I have rarely seen Luton's rearguard so jittery. Nicholl did not look fully fit in spite of stringent fitness tests on Friday. So John Moore had extra work to do and he found the going tough.

Mistakes

So did Slough, and John Ryan came through with most credit at the back. There was help from Keen and Givens but both made mistakes.

The sodden pitch made the going tricky all round but once Luton survived City's initial burst they began to settle and played some cool football.

Even so it was only Bristol's inability to score from simple positions that kept Luton in it.

How things changed. Highly-rated Chris Garland fought magnificently to get back in the game and on the hour he headed against a post with Read well beaten and centre-half Rooks blasted home the rebound.

Five minutes later Garland made up for his earlier misses by netting through a hesitant defence. A minute later he won the game for Bristol by slamming in number three with Read stranded yards out of his goal.

Goodeve was sent on in place of Anderson in a vain attempt to salvage some pride. But there was nothing for Luton.

In fact Garland should have increased the City lead but with feet fumbling in excitement at the prospect of a spectacular hat-trick he missed a sitter. This followed a ghastly mistake by Givens.

Macdonald and Busby came through with a fair measure of credit, both going close on other occasions. But Rookes had a fine afternoon against Macdonald.

There was some brave running from wingers Anderson and Jimmy Ryan. But at this stage of the season courage is not enough. Both could have found themselves out of work at Millwall today.

Disappointment

Tossing away these points
— and possibly promotion —
must have been a great
disappointment to Luton. It
certainly was to their 500
supporters who braved the
rail go-slow to see this match.

"It's the story of our season," said Mr Stock, "losing matches that look won.

"Football is not like any other job. You can't go into work on Monday and say: 'We'll do treble time today to make up for that'.

"Once you have lost, that's it. It's all over. It's final. It's already in the history books."
