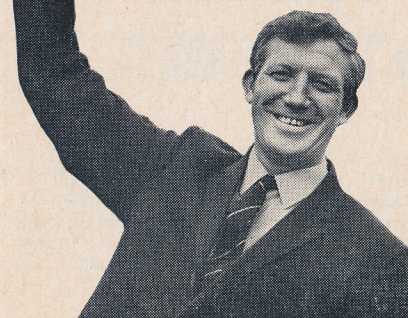
All our players are performing well with infinite belief in their own personal performances and more important still, have confidence in each other.

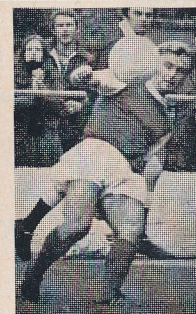

This week we have a most unusual tale to tell which must qualify for the best soccer story of coincidence of 1971.

It involves John Sissons.

On September 25th, we asked a photographer in Oxford to go along to the match between Oxford United and The Owls to take an action picture of John Sissons.

The photograph he took is the one featured above and it subsequently appeared on the front cover of our programme (left) for the match here at Hillsborough against Fulham on October 2nd.

A few days ago, Mr. Eric Taylor, our general manager received a letter from a young lady in Hayes, Middlesex telling him that she was the person standing in the crowd behind John Sissons when the picture was taken . . .

Her name — Christine Sissons, John's sister.

The incredible thing about it all is that John had no knowledge of her presence at the game because she decided to travel to Oxford only at the last minute and did not contact him to say she would be there.

Mr. Taylor says he thinks the coincidence is one in a million, and we certainly agree.

Today's Referee — MR. ROBERT MATTHEWSON of Worsley, Lancs.

A former professional footballer with Bolton Wanderers, Mr. Matthewson began refereeing in Bolton 12 years ago and progressed through Lancashire leagues, the Northern Premier League and the League Line to the Referees List in 1968/69. In April, 1970 he appeared at Wembley as Linesman in the F.A. Cup Final between Leeds and Chelsea. On January 5th, Mr. Matthewson will re-appear here at Hillsborough as the referee for the League Cup Semi-final replay between Stoke and West Ham.

Our visit to Hillsborough last season was a memorable one for we won that game by five goals to one. However you held us to a two-all draw at Kenilworth Road.

They were valuable points for us, because of our bid for a place in the First Division. Unhappily we just failed to gain promotion.

In our away matches we won six times, drew six and lost nine — scoring 22 goals and conceding 25.

So far this season we have had mixed fortunes and are currently lying three places below you with 21 points from 22 matches.

There is still a long way to go before the end of the season and we are striving to improve our position.

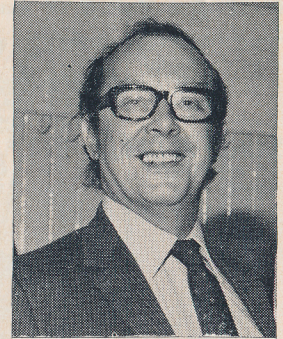
As you all know our prolific and highly talented goal-scorer Malcolm MacDonald is now playing for Newcastle and he has been joined recently at St. James' Park by Viv Busby who is on loan to them.

Viv was also an effective goal-scorer for us and so our manager, Alec Stock, has drafted in two new players.

In September, we paid Fulham £30,000 for striker **Vic Halom** as Malcolm's replacement. Vic, a Londoner, began his career with Orient. Our most recent signing is **Gordon Hindson** for whom we paid Newcastle £27,500. Gordon, an outside-left, is 21-years-old and made fleeting appearances in United's League side. Our Lancashire-born 'keeper **Tony Read** has been displaced several times but has always bounced back. He'll be known to Hillsborough fans because he played for Wednesday before moving on to Peterborough. Right-back **John Ryan**, another Londoner, is the best free transfer signing we've made because he was allowed to leave

Fulham after having made 21 appearances in their first team. He was formerly with Arsenal. **Alan Slough** is 23 and a Luton boy who had a brilliant season last year in the back four. **Mike Keen**, our skipper came to us from Q.P.R. for £18,000. He has made over 500 League appearances and captained Rangers during their meteoric rise to Division 1 and in their League Cup triumph.

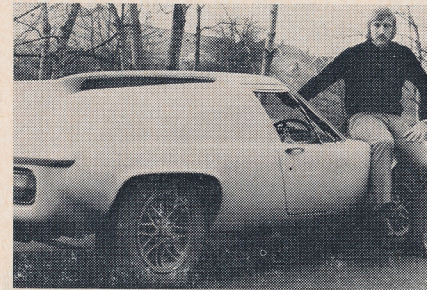
Our wing-half **David Court** cost Luton £35,000 when he moved from Arsenal just over a year ago. **Chris Nicholl** came to Luton via Halifax Town and many believe he was one of the best centre-halves in the whole division last season. Wing-half **John Moore**, a Scot who came to us on a free transfer from Motherwell is the longest serving member of the playing staff. **Peter Anderson** made his debut for Luton while still an amateur. He was formerly with Hendon. **Jimmy Ryan** and **Don Givens** are former Manchester United players. Ryan is a Scot from Stirling and Givens, who is Dublin-born, is a regular member of the Eire team.

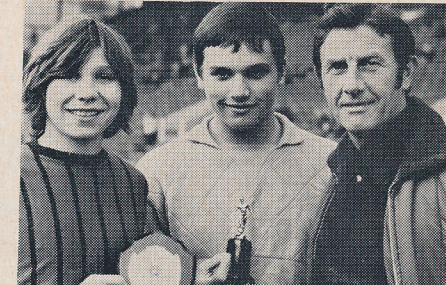
THE SUPER MOBILE

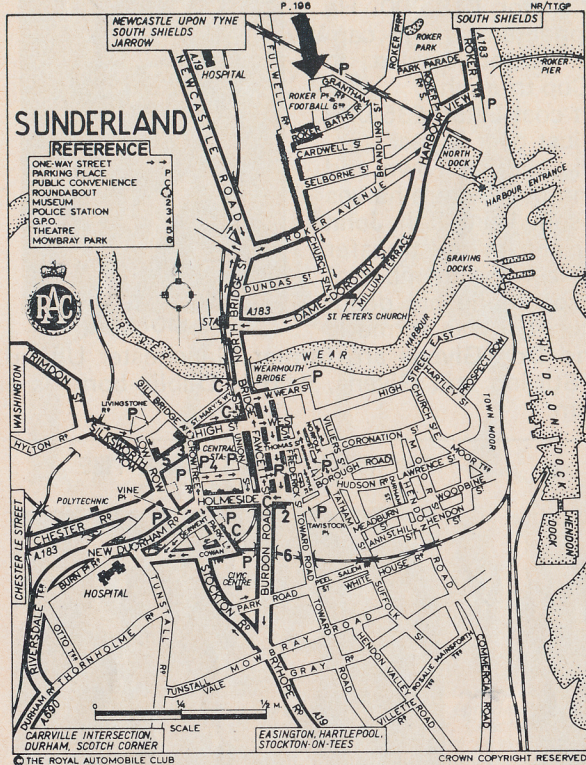
The coaches will return to Sheffield immediately after the match.

Leave by Attercliffe Road, A630, crossing the M1 to Rotherham. Enter by Sheffield Road and leave by Doncaster Road, A630, as for Doncaster. 8 miles on turn left A1(M). Follow signs for 'The North' on the A1 via Wetherby, Boroughbridge and Catterick Bypasses to Scotch Corner.

Continue northwards on the A1 (M) Darlington and Durham Bypass to its junction with A690, then via Houghton-le-Spring to:

SUNDERLAND — 123 Miles

Enter by Durham Road, left into Riversdale Terrace, on to New Durham Road. Left into Crowtree Road. Turn left at next roundabout into High Street then left into North Bridge Street. FOCUS . . .

on Dave Clements

Birthplace: Larne,
Northern Ireland.

Age: 26.

Height: 5ft. 9½ in.

Chatting with David Clements about football is an exhilarating experience. The look in his eyes when he talks about the game gives away his total commitment to it and his love for it, just as his lilting brogue reveals that he is as Irish as the Lakes of Killarney.

Some say he has kissed the Blarney Stone — others that he has swallowed it whole. But his sincerity is unquestionable.

When he arrived at Hillsborough last September with his pal Brian Joicey after their transfer from Coventry City, he said: "We have not come here to sit on the bottom of the Second Division."

At that time The Owls were languishing in the basement of Division II. Today — 13 matches later, Sheffield Wednesday are in the top 10 of the division and there can be little doubt that Clements and his pal have made a tremendous contribution to their rise in stature.

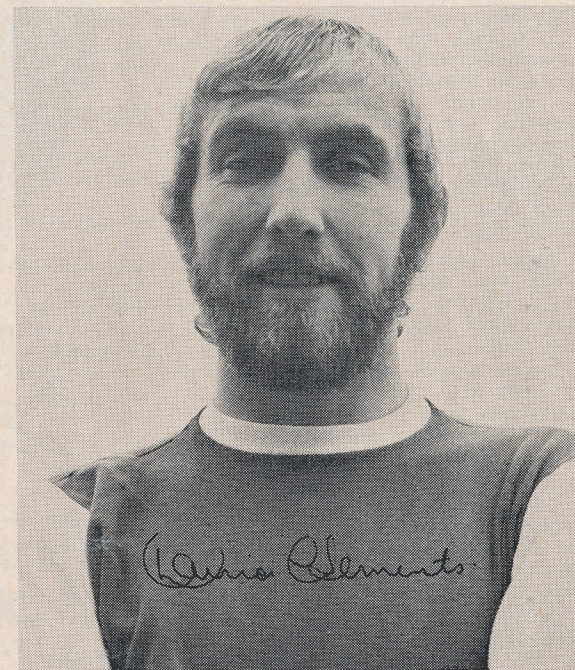
After his wife Ruth and baby daughter Shonagh, Clements clearly lives for football. His whole week is geared to Saturday afternoon: "I try to follow the same pattern each week. How I eat, sleep and the way I conduct my life during the football season is designed so that my mind and body is tenuous again on match days. I don't take it to extremes but I believe that professional footballers owe it to themselves, their club and their supporters to be in peak condition."

With this attitude of mind it is hardly surprising that Clements, who began his career with Portadown is a master of his craft. During the course of over 240 games for Coventry he played in every position except goalkeeper. Since his arrival at Hillsborough he has settled into a back four role with a special brief to attack down the flank when the situation presents itself. This he has done to great effect and his sorties into the opposition territory has been causing defences great concern.

"This is a man's game," he says. "Fifty per cent. of my ferocity is natural — the other 50% is manufactured. Soccer is a battle of wits but I never go out to hurt anybody."

Clements has played for Northern Ireland 21 times and he is fiercely proud of his international status. "I want to continue to play football for my country but equally I want to be a First Division footballer with Sheffield Wednesday and play in Europe with them. This is no pipe dream because although we had a bad start to the season, I would not say promotion is out of the question." When Clements, the son of a farmer, is not playing soccer he loves to get out into the country with his family, or play golf. "I lose on average a ball a hole," says Dave ruefully.

One gets the impression that a golf ball or two is all that this uncompromising professional is prepared to lose in life.

"His footwork is first class, he has a good turn of speed, a valuable body swerve and he distributes the ball with the judgment of a player of mature years. He will play for England one day."

This was the astute newspaper report in April, 1935 which appeared following the debut of a youngster called Jackie Robinson, a raw kid from Northumberland who had been pitch-forked into League soccer for Sheffield Wednesday against West Brom after only a handful of "A" team matches.

Jackie scored in that match which was played only a few days before Wednesday met West Brom again in the F.A. Cup Final.

Jackie arrived at Hillsborough in 1934 after being spotted in Northumberland by Billy Walker who was then our manager.

His international career began in 1937 against the Finns and in 1938 he played for the England team, which included the great Stanley Matthews, which beat the Germans by six goals to three in Munich.

Jackie's performances for Wednesday were full of magic. In the 1942/43 season he scored 35 goals, including six hat-tricks.

After the war Jackie went to Sunderland for £9,000 and six years later moved on to Lincoln where his career ended following a broken leg.

He returned to Northumberland in the early fifties but after a spell in the building trade and as a publican, ill-health forced him to retire.

The past few years have been very harsh on this brilliant inside-forward. He has fought against two serious illnesses with the type of courage and determination which made him such a great player.

Today, aged 54, Jackie lives with his wife and family in Shiremoor, Northumberland fighting bravely against ill-health.

I asked Dennis Woodhead, a former Wednesday player himself, about Jackie and he said: "One day during the war when Jackie was on leave he played for Wednesday and in the dressing room after he had showered I had the privilege of wiping his back. He was idolised at Hillsborough."
