Harry Haslam is such a huge personality at Kenilworth Road that it's difficult to understand how he remains one of the "backroom" brains in the public eye. When Harry first arrived at Luton three years ago, he was considered to have all the attributes that go towards making a successful entertainments manager. He is the kind of character who could miss the last bus and laugh all the way home!

But there is another Harry Haslam. Before he had time to think about a "London Palladium" in the Hatters Club, he was promoted to Chief Representative - though he likes to be known as Chief Scout. Harry's belief in a player called Malcolm MacDonald eventually earned Luton a reported £180,000 fee. Had he been spotting singers instead of soccer players, Harry would now probably be rated a better talent scout than even Hughie Green!

Harry says "Mac's development was a lucky break because I had promised his mother from the time that Malcolm was 16 that I would look after him as long as he staved in football." Macdonald turned pro under Haslam at Tonbridge before Bobby Robson paid £1,000 for him to join Fulham. When Harry linked with Luton it wasn't long before he "persuaded" the club to part with £17,000 for his pupil.

The Haslam football career began at Old Trafford when he joined United as a 14-year-old. He moved on to Brighton and Orient and later signed for Guildford. Now he says: "I get a kick out of spotting a youngster and seeing him make the grade, I recommend them, Ken Whitfield and Jimmy Andrews do the coaching and finally Alec Stock does the scheming. It all gives me a wonderful sense of satisfaction." When Alec Stock was asked before the season for his promotion fancies, he immediately named Millwall as a team which could surprise the amateur tipsters. Sure enough, our manager's judgment was proved correct when the Lions started the season with an unbeaten run of 12 games and reached the half-way mark in second place.

Hatters fans will sadly remember the matches last Spring which prompted Mr. Stock to form a favourable assessment of Millwall's credentials. We were in close contact with the pacemakers when Millwall came to Kenilworth Road in March and took a point with a 1-1 draw. Then, in the crucial Easter period which saw our promotion hopes perish, we crashed 4-0 at The Den.

That was all part of a run which saw Millwall take 18 points from the last 11 games and move into a final position of eighth in the table, only two points behind Luton. It was also the period in which the Londoners revealed a flair for exploiting the scoring power of their new twinspearhead. Derek Possee and Barry Bridges.

The signing of Bridges for club record £40,000 was a master-stroke by manager Benny Fenton, who needed a new striker to replace Keith Weller after his £100,000 move to Chelsea.

Bridges, formerly an England centre forward with Chelsea, has been an outstanding success since switching to the Second Division with Birmingham City. He was their top scorer with 23 goals in 1967-68 and only his need to move nearer his Eastbourne hotel business prompted his transfer to QPR, then in the First Division.

He shared the top scorers' spot for them in 1968-69 and a year later popped home 21 goals for the Loftus Road club in Division II. Then he joined Millwall in September, 1970, and for the fourth consecutive season he was a club's leading marksman — this time with 15 goals in 35 matches.

He is again challenging for the honour this term as Millwall prove that a side can play the allegedly defensive 4-4-2 and still score goals. Millwall failed to net in three games during the first half of the campaign when only Burnley scored more than the Lions' 34 goals.

The one major signing is Derek Smethurst, the South African forward captured from Chelsea for £40,000. Manager Fenton also tried to buy Wolves' Irishinternational schemer, Danny Hegan, until negotiations with the player broke down recently.

The proposed Hegan deal was the club's reaction to countering a sticky spell in which Millwall dropped three points in four games, including a 4-0 trouncing at Preston for only their second defeat of the season. In making a £25,000 cheque open to their manager, the Directors were pledging an all-out bid to remove Millwall's unwanted distinction as the only

London club never to appear in the First Division.

It was also a bold move intended to convince their East London supporters that bigger gates are needed to maintain the financial situation. Millwall are averaging only just over 14,000 fans per match — a statistic which is disappointing for a club which has worked so hard to bring success.

Only ten years ago, Millwall were in the Fourth Division, but then came a rapid climb towards the top. They won the bottom-section Championship in 1961-62, recovered from the jolt of immediate relegation to regain promotion in 1964-65, and a year later marched into the Second Division.

During this period of "double promotion" Millwall instigated an all-time League record of 59 unbeaten home games, stretching from August, 1964, to January 14, 1967. Cold Blow Lane is still one of the most difficult grounds in the country for visitors to win points and the Lions are again undefeated on home territory this term.

Their most important result was to smash Norwich City's unbeaten start with a 2-1 win on October 23rd, but when we went to Millwall in September, it was not one of their better days and we grabbed a well-deserved 2-2 draw. Let's hope we can add two points today — even if it weakens Alec Stock's prediction for Millwall's success this season!

Harry Cripps has built quite a reputation as an attacking fullback in recent years and, though he didn't particularly want the job, he took over as Millwall's penalty king. But, after missing three penalties in two games against Norwich last season, he decided to hand that job over to Gordon Bolland.

"No one really wanted to take them," smiled Harry. "So as captain I felt I should take responsibility. Now Gordon's doing the job well - he scored two penalties against Watford the other day - I'm quite relieved to be rid of it."

Harry Cripps started his professional career with West Ham but he didn't manage to get a League game with the Hammers. It took him a little while to settle at The Den, too, following a transfer in 1961. But from 1962/63, he began to play regularly and only injuries have kept him out of the side over the past seven years. One thing he has never managed to do, though, is play in every game in a season. He'll be unlucky again this term, for an injury in their opening game of the season caused him to miss several games and later knocks have also taken their toll. When Harry is out of the side Denis Burnett acts as skipper.

After those penalty boobs. Harry says he is anxious to add to his goals tally - "but from open play", he laughed. Yet he did take one penalty this season against Luton - and scored! Harry's happy-go-lucky outlook makes him a big favourite at The Den. He's hoping to repay the loyal Lions' fans who have supported him by leading Millwall into the First Division for the first time in their history.

BRYAN KING (Goalkeeper): Born Bishops Stortford, age 24. Signed for Millwall in June, 1967, from Chelmsford City, and is now considered one of the best custodians in the 2nd Division. DAVID MACKIE (Goalkeeper): Born Edinburgh, age 19. Signed

from Dundee in May, 1970. Millwall have high hopes for this young 'keeper.

BRIAN BROWN (Full Back): Born Shoreditch, age 21. Established his place in the League side during the 1969-70 season after joining the Lions from Chelsea in March, 1968. One of the Club's most improved players last season.

**DENNIS BURNETT** (Wing Half): Born Bermondsey, age 27. An experienced defender with over 200 League appearances to his credit he ioined Millwall at the start of the 1967-68 season from West Ham United.

ALAN DORNEY (Wing Half): Born Bermondsey, age 24. He has been with the Club since the age of 16, first as an amateur, then as a parttime professional and finally as a full-time professional, signing in 1968. Now firmly established in the First Team.

DAVID COXHILL (Wing Half): Born Northfields, age 19. Previously an amateur with Millwall since 1967. Signed professional forms in June, 1970, and made his League debut

at the end of last season.

GEORGE JACKS (Wing Half): Born Stepney, age 25, Came to Millwall from Queen's Park Rangers in July, 1965. A 100 per cent player in whatever role he is asked to play. BARRY KITCHENER (Centre Half): Born Dagenham, age 23. Took over as the First Team pivot in 1967 at the age of 19. Worked his way up through the Club's junior teams to become a very highly rated

defender.

DEREK POSSEE (Forward): Born Southwark, age 25, Signed from Tottenham Hotspur in August, 1967, for a then-record transfer fee. Scored 14 goals last season to be second highest goalscorer.

EAMONN DUNPHY (Forward): Born Dublin, age 26, A current Eire International he was transferred to Millwall in January, 1966, after playing for Manchester United and York City.

BILLY NEIL (Forward): Born Midlothian, age 26. Signed from Bonnyrig Rose in March, 1964. Has now recovered from a knee operation carried out in November, 1970, which restricted his First Team appearances last season.

BARRY BRIDGES (Forward): Born Norwich, age 30. Joined the Club in September, 1970, from Queen's Park Rangers for a record fee. A former England International he has also played for Chelsea and Birmingham City. Leading scorer last season with 15 goals and toured Australia this summer with the F.A. party.

GORDON BOLLAND (Forward): Born Boston, age 28. Came to the Club in October, 1968, from neighbours Charlton Athletic, Has also played for Chelsea, Orient and Norwich City.

DOUG ALLDER (Forward): Born London, age 19. A former England Youth International, he became an apprentice professional in April, 1968, and then a full-time professional in October, 1969. Is now an established member of the First Team squad.

STEVE BROWN (Forward): Born Peckham, age 19. Another former Youth player, he signed apprentice forms in April, 1968, and became a full-time professional in June, 1970. Made his League debut during last

BILLY HOLMES (Forward): Born Balham, age 20. Signed as a fulltime professional for the Club during the summer of 1970 after playing as an amateur with Woking.


DEREK SMETHURST (Forward): Born Durban. Played in South African football before coming to England to accept a professional contract with Chelsea. He scored four goals in his first 12 League games last season and appeared again this term before joining Millwall for £40,000 in September.




Top right: Gordon Hindson in the hunt to improve his goal averages was unlucky to see this effort flash wide with two of Orient's defenders on his heels.

## Sportsman in the know Talking to Robin Wainwright

Some footballers careers "explode" overnight to spiral them into the trapping sof luxury and riches for the remainder of their life. But the majority follow a more set pattern of progress which, in many respects, can lead a youngster to enjoy his game even more — and without ever being poor.

Such is the case of Robin Wainwright, Luton's home-spun product, who has matured through the ranks and various stages of soccer "apprenticeships" virtually to the letter. Robin got his first chance in the senior side this season at the age of 20, not by any standards today, considered remarkable. But when this bright midfield prospect reached the grade of League football, he could claim that he broke through the barrier on schedule after six years' association with the

He first caught the eye of the Kenilworth Road scouts when turning out for Luton Technical College Seniors — and R. Wainwright made the dotted line for the first time when he was 14. From schoolboy terms, he graduated to an apprentice professional after his sixteenth birthday, and, at the appointed time one year later, he became a full professional.

His accent into the first team had followed rigid procedure. So carefully has he been groomed by Jimmy Andrews, that Robin Wainwright is likely to go only one way now — and that's for-

Born in Montrose Avenue and ready to move into a new house at Sundon Park next June, when

he gets married, Robin learned a lot of his ability with Limbury Boys Club, a Youth side which also housed Neil Rioch, now with Aston Villa, and Derek Edmunds, who had a spell at Leeds before joining Watford.

One of the treats he enjoyed while waiting in the wings for his breakthrough, were the annual trips abroad. He had three successive Whitsuns in Holland with a Luton party which played in a Youth tournament at Rotterdam.

Alan Slough, Chris Nicholl and Don Shanks were also in the squad and they have happy memories of their clashes with teams from Switzerland, Czechoslovakia and the host country, because they won the trophy once and were close on two other occasions.

It was unfortunate, to some extent, that when he was called up by Alec Stock that he had to organise himself on his debut as a direct attacker, whereas he had been almost exclusively assigned to a deep lying role in the reserves.

Robin told us: "I'm only too keen to play for the first team. But everyone must have a preference and that's mine. I prefer to hold the ball and use it constructively. But that's terribly difficult when you have a shadow who marks your every move."

So far, Robin's appearances have been less than double figures, after making his debut against Preston. He did, however, sample the top quality of the Fourth Division last season when he joined Cambridge United for a spell on loan.
