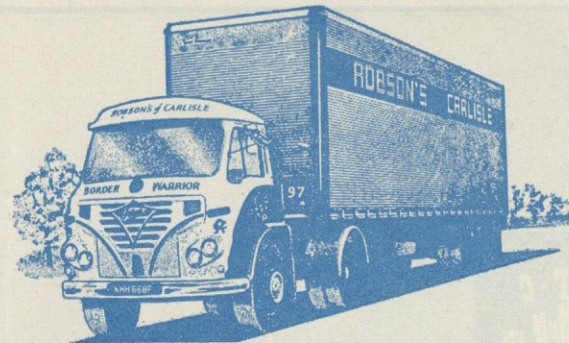

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VIEWPOINT

It won't have gone unnoticed by the men who would like to put an end to the temporary transfer, that during the past week the second division leaders, Norwich, obtained the loan of Bobby Bell from Crystal Palace.

It's a bad rule when you can borrow a player for a month or two, say the critics of the idea. It was originally intended to help clubs in the lower divisions and is open to all sorts of abuse.

Now I can understand that given the right set of circumstances the loan of a player could lead to a bit of suspicion regarding the true motive. A club helping another club in the same city for example . . . for although I couldn't see the clubs in Manchester or Liverpool doing each other any favours, there's room for the old pals act in London between clubs in different divisions, and the player isn't called upon to do any major uprooting of home and family.

And it must be frustrating for managers of clubs fighting for promotion or to avoid the relegation area to find rivals suddenly strengthened by a man borrowed from a friendly neighbour. I can recall struggling Fulham getting a new lease on life from the temporary move of Alan Stephenson from West Ham and several 2nd division clubs have taken advantage of the rule to acquire players. Even Newcastle found it necessary to have Luton's Viv Busby in their side while they made up their minds whether he was going to do, and invited criticism from those who thought that the rule was introduced to help young players to be farmed out to gain experience rather than as a commencement of a 'try before you buy' era.

If it was a surprise that one of the game's big spenders should exhibit an air of caution it is nevertheless understandable at a time when money is tight and the opportunity isn't there to watch the player in first class company. It won't become general practice because in the first place there are still so many men in the game prepared to gamble on their own judgement and secondly there aren't many clubs who can afford to be without a player for a month or two.

And if a club has little to lose under such an arrangement except a month or two's wages, well the same opportunity is open to all the clubs and with clubs normally restricted to two loan players a season, nobody is going to be able to borrow a fresh set of numbers.

Perhaps the signing on loan of Bobby Bell might not go down very well among the clubs who feel they have a chance of overhauling Norwich in the promotion race, but with a first choice centre half out of the game since injury in October and the gap at the top of the table closing fast, all manager Ron Saunders appears to be 'guilty' of in the Palace transaction is a bit of enterprise.

It might be enough to help them into the first division, it might fail. At least he won't have attempted to buy promotion and found he'd bought failure for this season . . . and usually a few more.

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INTRODUCING OUR VISITORS by Tony Pullein

The biggest problem facing Luton manager Alec Stock as this season got under way was — how could he find a successor to Malcolm Macdonald? In his two seasons at Luton, Macdonald scored 58 goals and with so many First Division clubs showing interest in him it was inevitable — when Luton's own promotion bid failed last season — that he would move. Newcastle paid £180,000 to sign him and, with First Division experience behind him, he seems poised to win an England cap very soon.

Mr. Stock tried several players in Macdonald's position. Don Givens was first in the number nine shirt but when the goals failed to come, Robin Wainwright was promoted from the reserves and defender Alan Slough switched to a mid-field role to lend support. Finally, Mr. Stock spent £30,000 of his reserve fund to sign Fulham's Vic Halom — no doubt hoping he might repeat the feats of the last player Stock got from Craven Cottage: Malcolm Macdonald!

He later negotiated the transfer of Newcastle's reserve striker Gordon Hindson who had impressed in his rare games in the senior side.

Compared with the past few seasons, this one has been something of a disappointment for the Hatters. Yet one must allow Luton their lapse for few clubs have ever matched their magnificent record over the past four years. Since the beginning of the 1967/68 campaign — their Fourth Division promotion year — it has been success all the way for Luton and only one of the 92 League clubs (Leeds United!) has collected more points over the same period.

During that run Luton became only the second club in League history to collect as many as 60 points in three consecutive seasons.

Luton's magnificent bid to clinch promotion last season for the second year in succession finally exploded at Easter when they lost two games in as many days. Until then there had been a distinct possibility they would regain the First Division place they lost in 1960.

The Luton club has had a varied history, sometimes hitting the highest spots, often sinking to the bottom of the pile. The club was formed in 1885, playing friendly matches until being accepted by the Southern League nine years later. They maintained a good position, gathering sufficient support to gain admittance to the Second Division of the Football League in 1897.

Things didn't go well, though. Serious financial problems arose and, when they finished second from bottom in 1900, they didn't bother to apply for re-election. So it was back to the Southern League where they remained until the first division was taken over en bloc to form the Third Division (South) of the Football League in 1920.

They had to wait until 1937 before they regained Second Division status which they held until a fantastic finish to the 1954/55 campaign saw them scrape into the First Division on goal-average. Contrary to most people's expectations, Luton made a good impression in the highest sphere and by 1959 they were good enough to earn themselves a Wembley visit to meet Nottingham Forest in the F.A. Cup final. Unfortunately, they struck a complete off-day and, though Forest played most of the game with only ten men, Luton were still defeated by two goals to one.

Luton's fortunes took a dramatic turn from that day at Wembley. Twelve months later they were relegated to the Second Division, in 1963 they sank into Division Three and two years later — disaster, disaster! — they plummeted into the Fourth Division.

THE SECOND DIVISION SCENE by Tony Pullein

Second Division sides certainly enjoyed a real heyday last Saturday, three of them defeating First Division opposition and a total of six were guaranteed a place in the last 16 — the highest number since 1960/61 when seven clubs from this section survived.

Pride of place went to Orient who won 2-0 at Leicester. The amazing thing about that result was that lowly Orient had previously won only one away match all season, and that against the Second Division's bottom club Watford. It was bad enough in itself for Leicester manager Jimmy Bloomfield to be beaten by his old club but the real irony lay in the fact that Orient's first goal was scored by little Ian Bowyer — Mr. Bloomfield's last signing for Orient before he left for Leicester last summer!

Orient's reward was a lucrative home tie with fellow Londoners Chelsea, who now rank among the favourites to win the trophy. Indeed, their chances of becoming the first club ever to appear in two Wembley finals in one season must now be very bright indeed.

Hull City hit top form to defeat Coventry City 1-0 on their own ground, the only goal coming from Ken Wagstaff who, until quite recently, had been having a very lean time. But he has now scored in their last four matches. Prior to this he had scored only twice.

The Tigers, who last season reached the sixth round, have produced two magnificent Cup results this season. In the previous round they demolished Second Division leaders Norwich City 3-0 on their own ground — the Canaries' only home defeat so far. Now the Tigers' "reward" for those two fine away victories is another away trip — to the winners of this week's Stoke v. Tranmere replay. Stoke last season ended Hull's Cup hopes by beating them in the quarter final.

Birmingham City's home tie against First Division Ipswich was virtually settled in the first 30 seconds when Bob Latchford scored his 19th goal of the season. The Blues have also enjoyed some good Cup runs in recent years

and, with a home tie in the next round against fellow Second Division side Portsmouth, they have an excellent chance of making the last eight. It was only a month ago that Birmingham met Portsmouth in the League at St. Andrew's, suffered an early shock when Pompey snatched a 2-0 lead but eventually ran out easy winners by 6-3. Portsmouth overcame Third Division rivals Swansea 2-0, with the help of a Herbie Williams' own goal.

Middlesbrough seemed to have gained revenge for their 0-1 League defeat at Millwall a week earlier when they led 2-0 with only four minutes to go. But the Lions fought back in magnificent style to earn a replay. If Middlesbrough won the second game then they must face Manchester United in the next round — a familiar task for them.

Last season Middlesbrough knocked United out of the F.A. Cup in a replay after drawing at Old Trafford. The previous season they met in both Cups, United winning both times but only after another replay in the F.A. Cup. It would be Middlesbrough's second trip to Manchester this season. They drew with Manchester City in the third round of this season's competition and won the home replay 1-0.

The incentive for Cardiff and Sunderland in their postponed fourth round tie was the prospect of a home game with either Leeds or Liverpool at the next stage.

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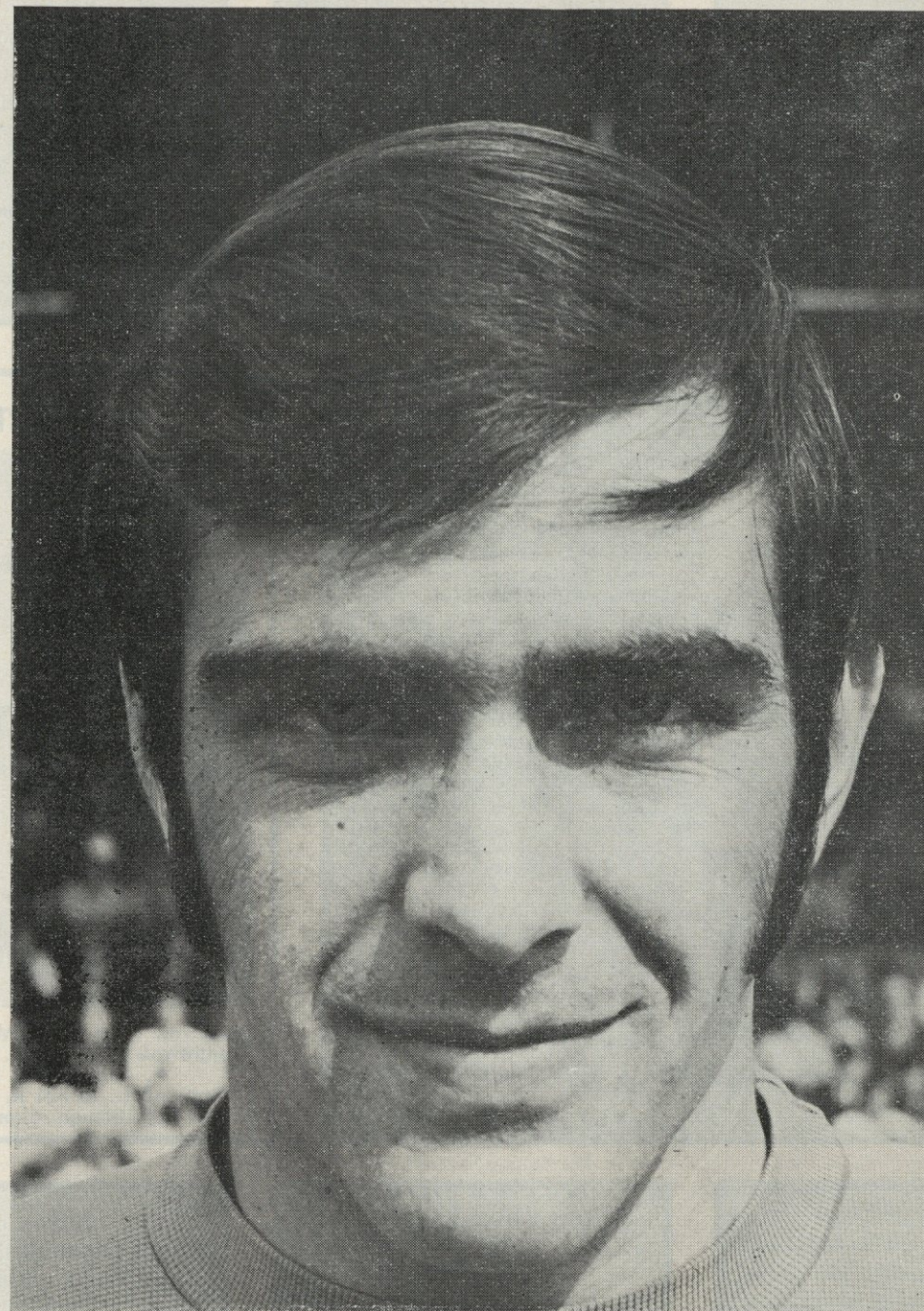
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MEET THE PLAYERS

THE VISITING CAPTAIN . . .

Queen's Park Rangers spotted **MIKE KEEN** playing for Bucks Boys Club and signed him on amateur forms in 1957. A year later he turned professional and, after spending another year in the reserves, he made his League debut at York in 1959/60.



He played a major role in the club's most successful season—1966/67 when they won the Third Division championship by a record margin of points and beat West Bromwich 3-2 in the League Cup final at Wembley. The following year Rangers equalled Charlton's 32-year-old record by rising in successive seasons into Division One.

Soon afterwards things began to erupt at Shepherd's Bush. Manager Stock was shown the door but, within days was appointed team chief at Luton. And one of his earliest signings was Mike Keen from his old club.

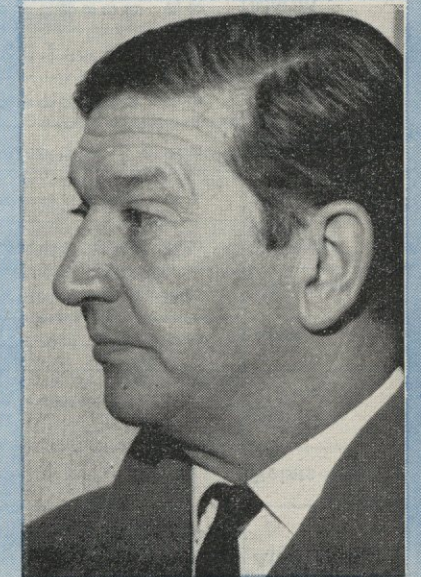

. . . AND THE MANAGER

ALEC STOCK, the manager, first hit the headlines in 1948 when he steered Southern League Yeovil Town to astonishing Cup victories over Bury and Sunderland.

In August 1949 he was appointed manager of Leyton Orient and built the side which won promotion to Division II in 1956. He moved to Arsenal as assistant manager in 1956 but he was greatly disillusioned by conditions on the coaching side at Highbury so he returned to Orient within a couple of months. The challenge of Italian soccer was laid before him and he took control of Roma F.C. but once again returned to Leyton Orient when they were in trouble.

Alec Stock finally severed his connections with Orient in March 1959 and three months later became manager of Queen's Park Rangers, whose success under his able command was phenomenal. They won the League Cup and rose from the Third to the First Division.



He left Queen's Park Rangers in November 1968 and shortly afterwards took over at Luton.

JIM RYAN (Outside right). Jim developed in soccer's top academy at Manchester United. He couldn't oust the big names on a permanent basis so when Luton made an offer for him in April, 1970 he was happy to step down a rung.

League record: Manchester United 21(3) aps., 4 gls.; Luton 37(8) aps., 3 gls.

PETER ANDERSON (Outside right). Peter made an extraordinarily quick rise from amateur circles into the League spotlight last February. He was playing for Isthmian Leaguers Hendon when manager Alec Stock signed him and immediately promoted him to the League team. Now he is the Hatters' leading scorer with 10 goals.

League record: Luton 40(1) aps., 11 gls.

DAVID COURT (Inside right). David developed in Arsenal's junior sides and stepped into their League team in 1962/63. There were many occasions when he held a regular place in the Gunners' side and he played for them in the 1969 League Cup final. Luton signed him in the 1970 close-season.

League record: Arsenal 167(7) aps., 17 gls.; Luton 40(2) aps.

VIC HALOM (Centre forward). Luton paid Fulham £30,000 for Vic in September. Charlton gave him his first chance in League football in 1965/66 but he didn't often get into their senior side. Orient signed him in 1967 and two years later collected £35,000 when he moved to Fulham.

League record: Charlton 8(3) aps.; Orient 53 aps., 12 gls.

DON GIVENS (Inside left). Don won two international caps before making his League debut for Manchester United two seasons ago. He signed for Luton in April 1970 and was the Hatters' second-highest scorer with 13 goals last season.

League record: Manchester Utd. 4(4) aps., 1 gl.; Luton 67 aps., 16 gls.

GORDON HINDSON (Outside left). Gordon had an odd experience when travelling down to Luton to complete his transfer in October. Newcastle, his club, ran short of players and sent an SOS for him to play against Arsenal at Highbury before he signed the forms! It was one of only rare first-team appearances for him.

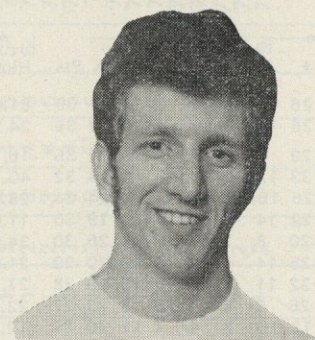
BEAT THE THREAT

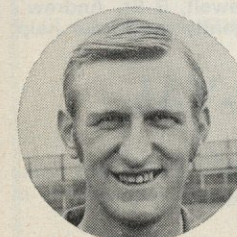
