Barber was in superb form generally, but had less to occupy him than Cooper, who had to move smartly to the edge of his area to cut out a promising longrange shot by Halom.

Birmingham were also in trouble when John Ryan took them by surprise with fast 60-yard sprint down ie wing, but he ran out of

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
