The First Division defence, too, was in deep trouble as the Town, yards faster to the ball, sprayed the passes about and built up swift attacks which led to a hail of shots at the Birmingham goal, most of which were well on target.

Luton's first emergency came when a mistake by Faulkner put them in trouble as he miskicked in trying to clear from Francis, but generally Birmingham were never being able to threaten in the same manner as the rampant Town forwards.

The first of three Birming-ham players to have their names taken was booked in the 25th minute, when Burns

had his name taken for a foul on Anderson. This was the second booking that Burns had received in the tie, because he also went into the notebook at Kenilworth Road last Wednesday. Before the ball was cleared from the free kick, the ever alert Busby sent a header just wide.

Still the Town kept pressing forward, and Latchford made a splendid save by the far post to prevent a long, angled drive by Jimmy Ryan from the right wing from finding a billet in the net. Next, he flung himself across the goal to foil Luton again with a flying save from Aston.

## Chances

Birmingham probably had their best chance of the half when Burns headed just over the top from a free kick on the edge of the area just before half-time.

But the best chance of the match fell to the Town straight after half-time when Halom sent Busby through with a great ball. The centre-
