SHORN OF their brightest star, Don Rogers, and manager Dave Mackay in one week, Swindon needed all their fighting heart to win their first away League win of the season. It was a brave and bonny performance, for Luton had more class, more control, and far more of

the game.

But Swindon's new captain, rightback Rod Thomas, mar-

shalled his team well.

Centre half Frank Burrows was the rugged rock against whom most of Luton's attacks foundered.
