As Cardiff were pressed back, Fred Pethard, after a shaky, opening on his first senior game since August, emerged as their best defender. Cardiff emerged full of fight for the second half, and were denied a penalty appeal in the 46th minute, when John Moore appeared to trip Billy Kellock.

Woodruff, who has twice come close to scoring earlier, underlined their revival by flicking home a 50th-minute equaliser after Andy McCulloch opened the Luton defence with a powerful header.
