MATCH

The first Second Division F.A. Cup success in over 40 years. The first hattrick of F.A. Cup Final appearances this century. And a fabulous goal-a-round achievement for a young striker in his first season in top class football. These—plus, possibly, Sunderland's second Wembley success!— are feats very much on the cards today as the F.A. Cup competition goes into one of its most exciting stages.

Each of today's four sixth round ties, in fact, offers the prospect of new ground being broken in this century-old competition — the oldest, and most exciting, in the world.

The winners of today's Roker Park tie will guarantee a Second Division club in the semifinals — just 90 minutes away from Wembley and within a further 90 minutes of pulling off the first Second Division victory at Wembley since West Bromwich beat Birmingham 2 - 1 in 1931.

A Sunderland victory today would put us into the semi-final for the first time since 1956. Luton last made the semis in 1959, the year they were beaten at Wembley.

Arsenal are now closer than any club has ever been this century to reaching three successive F.A. Cup Finals. F.A. Cup winners of 1971, they were beaten by Leeds in last year's final. The possibility of a hat-trick of Wembley appearances is their incentive to win at Chelsea today.

With Leeds' own hopes still very much alive — since they won a League game at Derby, where they play today, a fortnight ago — there is still a chance that we might see the final contested by the same clubs in successive seasons for the first time since 1885, when Blackburn Rovers and Queen's Park (Glasgow) made it two years running.

The closest we have come to a repeat was in 1969 when **Everton** and **West Bromwich**, the 1968 finalists, were both knocked out in the semi-finals.

One man aiming to stop Leeds making it is Derby's young centre-forward Roger Davies, now the F.A. Cup's level top scorer. Davies and Allan Clarke are the only players to have scored in every round this season. Only nine players have ever gone right through to the finals, scoring in every round. Now Davies has the

chance to do that in only his first season as a first-team player.

Leading F.A. Cup scorers at the moment

6 goals - Clarke (Leeds), Davies (Derby):

5 goals - Hector (Derby);

4 goals — Chivers (Spurs), Field (Blackburn), Joicey (Sheff, Wed), and Jones, G. (Bolton).

Coventry City can smash all club records if they defeat Wolves today.

Apart from Coventry City, who have never played in the semi-final, Derby have waited longer than any of the other of today's survivors since getting to the last four. They haven't managed it since 1948.

The Hatters are here Today!

Today's game against Luton is against a team of new faces. During the summer Mike Keen, Don Givens and Chris Nicholl all left for new Clubs. Added to the players Manager Alec Stock has left to take up a new challenge in the form of Fulham. The change was based on purely personal reasons because Manager Stock was feeling the effects of his 120 mile round trip from his home in Epsom to the Kenilworth Road ground at Luton.

Luton Town are now under the guidance of new manager Harry Haslam, formerly Chief Scout with the Club, and new coach Ray McCrohan. Together they have "revolutionised" the Luton Town style. Gone are the days when they employed midfield safety tactics and in their place they have substituted an all-out attacking policy.

Many teams play with a maximum of four players up front to get the goals, but Luton are claiming they play with Six goal-hungry forwards!

The forwards are all men bought from other clubs except **Peter Anderson**. They are **Jimmy Ryan** and **John Aston** two former Busby Babes at Manchester United; **Rodney Fern** from Leicester City.

Another man who was snapped up by Luton is former England fullback **Bobby Thompson**. He cost nothing from Birmingham City and he is now showing some of the form that won him several England caps in the mid-sixties.

Last season we only drew with Luton at home, but at Kenilworth Road John Lathan cracked in a goal to give us the spoils in an attacking display of football.

KEITH BARBER (goalkeeper)

Came late into the game as a professional, being in his early 20's, but has settled into the Luton team easily. Broke a leg in training recently, but amazingly, it is still hoped he will play at Roker today! Comes from Vauxhall (London) and played for Dunstable Town in the Southern League before joining Luton a couple of years ago.

JOHN RYAN (full back)

Probably the best transfer signing Luton have ever made because he was allowed to go by Fulham after having made 21 appearances in their team when they were relegated from Division II. Has developed into one of the fastest, most dependable backs in the Second Division. A Londoner, he had a spell with Arsenal before going to Craven Cottage.

JIMMY RYAN (outside right)

Almost certainly cost the greater part of £35,000 which Luton paid Manchester United with whom he could not secure a regular first team place. As a result, he became known as one of the best wingers in the Central League. A Scot from Sterling, he is twofooted and can take a turn on either wing. Scored one of the goals that earned the Hatters a 2–0 victory at Roker Park earlier in the season.

PETER ANDERSON (forward)

Made his debut whilst still on amateur forms against Watford on February 13th! Signed as a professional the following week. Previously he had been one of Hendon's most prominent stars and the move into a higher circle did not worry him because he maintained his place for most of the season.

VIV BUSBY (forward)

Obtained a regular first team place at Luton following the departure of Malcolm Macdonald to Newcastle United. However, lost form last season and was allowed to go on a months loan to First Division Newcastle United. Newcastle did not take their option to buy him and he returned to Kenilworth Road. Former Wycombe Wanderers player. Has a brother, Martyn, that plays for Q.P.R. although he is out of action at the moment with a broken leg.

DON FRANKS (forward)

Served his apprenticeship with Fulham who did not offer him terms as a full professional, so Luton quickly snapped him up! Since then he has developed quickly and was a regular member of the England Youth side that triumphed in the little World Cup in Czechoslovakia a few seasons ago. Is now regarded as a key member in the set up at Kenilworth Road.

Past Records

TONY PULLEIN

SUNDERLAND 7 LUTON 1. My forecast of today's F.A. Cup tie result? Not likely! Only a fool is given to predictions at this stage of the competition. And we certainly don't expect a score of that proportion anyway. That, in fact, was the result of our record victory over the "Hatters" — one of the 23 League and Cup games in which the clubs have clashed over the years.

It was on New Year's Eve 1960. For Sunderland fans it certainly was a New Year worth celebrating. So perhaps the many thousands of Luton followers, who have made the long journey up to Roker Park today, will forgive us for harking back to it.

Nothing very spectacular happened in the first-half. We were only 1–0 up then. But Roker burst to life as, backed by the cheers of almost 29,000 spectators, we really wheeled then in after the break. IAN LAUTHER hit a hat-trick, JIMMY DAVISON, WILLIE MCPHEAT, JIMMY MCNAB and even CHARLIE HURLEY got on target as we raised the final score to 7–1. GORDON TURNER hit Luton's goal.

Both games that season were high-scoring affairs. Earlier in the season we had drawn 3-3 at Kenilworth Road.

Those were League games, of course. All told we have met on 18 occasions in the League. We have also played five times in the F.A. Cup—a competition in which Luton have so far never beaten us!

The last time we were drawn together in the F.A. Cup was in January 1965 when both clubs were having their troubles. We were struggling desperately against relegation from the First Division, Luton were battling just as hard to keep out of the Fourth Division.

Luton had ground advantage. And, with the score still 0–0 at half-time, it was anyone's game. But, once again, we pulled out the stops in the second period and in the end coasted to a fairly easy 3–0 win, NICK SHARKEY bagging two of the goals, GEORGE MULHALL netting the other:

Perhaps our most memorable F.A. Cup meeting was back in 1937 — the year Sunderland won the Cup!

After beating Southampton 3–2 at The Dell in the third round, we were drawn away again at the next stage — at Luton. A crowd of over 20,000 packed the ground, but failed to see a result. JIMMY CONNOR and LEN DUNS scored for us in a tie that ended 2–2.

Thus, we met again at Roker a few days later. This time we made sure of a home game with Swansea in round five by defeating Luton 3–1, Duns and Connor again getting among the goals, with RAICH CARTER netting a third.

By failing to score against Luton, BOB GURNEY spoiled what would have been a fine record that season. Bob netted in the previous round and all subsequent rounds including the final, finishing our leading F.A. Cup scorer with six goals.

The only other occasion on which we met in the F.A. Cup was in 1906/07 when we were again drawn away. Again, a replay was needed, the first game ending goal-less. But we won the return 1-0.

Having earlier reminded Luton tans of our 7–1 victory in 1960, I suppose it is only fair to record that we were once beaten at Luton by

a similar score. And on one occasion Luton beat us 8—2 in a First Division game!

Let's gloss over the facts as quickly as possible! That 8—2 affair was played out at Kenilworth Road in November 1955 before a crowd of 25,785. It was 4—0 at half-time and we had to thank TED PURDON for his two second-half goals which gave the final scoreline a slightly more respectable look. Gordon Turner converted two penalties for Luton, BOB MORTON collected a hat-trick, CULLEN got two and ADAM one.

We met for only three seasons in Division One, Luton certainly turning in some outstanding performances against us at Kenilworth Road. On our next two trips we were beaten 6-2 and 7-1

But overall we have a far superior record over the Hatters, a summary of all previous games being:

Luton's last visit to Roker Park for a League game was on October 14 this season. VIC HALOM and JIMMY RYAN scored first-half goals which gave them a 2–0 win.
