lieve that it is essential for them to launch a campaign which will set a pattern for the future. The so-called "referees' revolution" in the Football League has produced a great improvement, but still, too often, the image of the game is damaged by the emphasis on indiscipline by players and misbehaviour by

As in England, so in Italy. The Organising Committee believes that it is time that clubs, players and spectators realised that the future prosperity of the game is in their hands. It is for them to improve the game's reputation and to bring back those whose interests have gone

The Organising Committee believes that it is necessary to penalise bad behaviour. At the same time, they believe that there is much to be said for rewarding good behaviour. The world has changed considerably since goodness was instinctive.

The supporters who claim to be behind their clubs now have an opportunity to help in the most practical way-by producing extra money, not by making contributions from their pockets, but simply by showing that they are sportsmen.

Equally, it is right that players and coaches should know that unethical behaviour will damage. not only the club's reputation, but its bank balance. Perhaps soccer has become too preoccupied with how to punish wrongdoing instead of considering how to reward sportsmanship.

Despite the often disproportionate attention given to the rare examples of bad behaviour during the three years of the Anglo-Italian Tournament, the Organising Committee is satisfied that the 75 competitive matches played have been a tremendous force for good.

Friendships have developed between clubs from both countries. players have realised the problems which can arise from the natural variations in interpretation, and have learned to adapt their techniques, as indeed, they have had to do in the three European competitions.

But it is not for anyone, whether competition organisers or club managers, to claim that all is well in the disciplinary field. That is why it is essential for someone to give a lead.





This famous Lancashire seaside club with a long and at times highly distinguished history has had little to enthuse about in recent seasons Promotion back to the First Division at the end of the 1969-70 season was followed by a season of struggle and eventual relegation But in the Anglo-Italian Competition. Blackpool have a record no other club can match.

Two years ago they won the tournament in convincing style by beating Bologna in the Final in

Italy after at one stage being a goal down. Last season they almost retained the trophy before going down to Roma in the Final.

There is no reason to doubt that Blackpool's challenge in the competition this season will not be as determined as it has been in the last two years.

For despite a change in management at Bloomfield Road the club has a side of promise and potential which at one stage in the season seemed capable of making a determined bid for promotion.

Harry Potts, who took over as manager when Bob Stokoe returned to his native North-East to revive the sagging fortunes of Sunderland, knows all about European competition at its highest level. A decade ago, as manager of League Champions Burnley, Potts guided the Turf Moor club into the European Cup and he was also in charge of a Football League side which took on the Italian League representative team.

Blackpool's side has undergone a slight transformation to the one that met Roma in last season's Anglo-Italian Final.

Tommy Hutchison left Bloomfield Road early this season to rejoin his former team-mate Gordon Milne, now in charge of team affairs at Coventry City. As part of the deal, Billy Rafferty, a tall, wellbuilt striker moved to Blackpool and soon made an impression as a player with skill and courage.

The rise of Crystal Palace objective in 1969 when they won greatest interest is ex-Swindon from Millwall. stemmed from a vow made in the 'Fifties' that not only would they runners-up to Derby County. aim for recognition amongst the elite but would also improve their amenities.

What they achieved is an object lesson to clubs similarly placed today. Palace won promotion to the Third Division in 1961, only three years after becoming founder members of the Fourth Division. They returned to the Second Division in 1964 after a gap of 40 years and finally attained their

promotion to Division One as winger Don Rogers.

Crystal Palace have proved just how jealously they regard their First Division status by investing in a new stand, improving their facilities, and being willing to spend on players to keep them in the top flight.



Fighting for their First Division lives vet still the League's top crowd pullers. That is this season's remarkable bitter-sweet summary of Manchester United's fortunes as the European Cup masters of five years ago return to challenge leading Continental opposition in this season's Anglo-Italian Tournament.

Just as many words have been written and opinions voiced about the Old Trafford club in recent months as in those heady days, not so long ago, when United were not only 'kings' of English but European soccer. For, whatever shortcomings they may have had on the field in this disastrous season, one fact remains . . . United's remarkable support in this country and abroad is as strong as it has always been.

That factor must make manager Tommy Docherty's task slightly easier. Docherty landed probably football's most testing Christmas present when he took over at Old grasp, has not been confined to Trafford in December.

He made an immediate impact with the signings of fellow Scots George Graham from Arsenal, Alex Forsyth from Partick Thistle and later Jim Holton, the Shrewsbury Town defender and Celtic's Lou Macari. Matches against top-rate Continental clubs are ready-made fixtures for such a venue. Apart from providing these, the Anglo-Italian Tournament will allow United to forget their League worries for a while.

In only 11 years as a Football League club, Oxford United have established themselves as a major force in the game: a powerful Second Division club who have threatened to break through into promotion challengers in recent seasons.

It adds up to a success story that no other club elected to the League since the War can match. 

Cup Final '72

A.S. Roma 3. Blackpool 1

Blackpool's loss of the Anglo-Italian Cup, which they won in 1971, may prove an ironic lifeline for the three-year-old tournament. Roma became the first Italian club to win it and the only one from the First Division in

This much-abused competition came genuinely to maturity in the torrid heat of Rome's Olympic Stadium. The football was fast and inventive and the sportsmanship from both sides of the highest order.

Fric Howarth, assistant secretary of the Football League, said: "Today it has been proved there there is real merit in this competition. It is encouraging to have such an advertisement for decent football after the way trouble spots in earlier matches have been highlighted."

Blackpool, who went into the final with an 18-1 goal average, were clearly unable to cope with the high temperature and, after an even first half, their defeat became inevitable. Indeed, Burridge, their couragous young goalkeeper, with sterling assistance from Suddaby and James, kept the English club in the match a little longer than they had the right to expect.

Roma, playing to their full potential, were far more incisive and they took the lead through Cappelini in the 49th minute.

The second goal came in the 75th minute when Scaratti, substitute for Cappellini. volleyed home beautifully from 20-yards. With five minutes remaining, Zigoni put Roma three up with a splendid solo effort.

Blackpool, game to the last, refused to surrender, and, with only seconds remaining Alcock, the second-half substitute for Hill, headed in a Burn's centre.

A.S. Roma became the first Italian club to ment when they defeated Blackpool, the holders 3-1 in the Final of the third competition at the Olympic Stadium in Rome on 24th June, 1972.

The Final, played in a temperature approaching 25 degrees centigrade was characterised by outstanding technical skill and sportsmanship. It was the vindication, if such was needed, of a Tournament which had received undue criticism in England.

Those who attacked the Tournament based their criticism on the fact that there had been trouble in a match between Cagliari and Sunderland, in which an Italian player was sent off, and at Stoke when Roma were the visitors, three players were dismissed.

These disciplinary measures were given unwarranted emphasis in the light of the fact that 23 other matches were completed in a spirit of complete amity. The dismissal of four players in 25 matches was less than five per cent of the average in both English and Italian Leagues.

In the first round of matches in Italy only Atalanta and Cagliari were able to win and at the end of the two rounds, the Italian-clubs had scored 17 goals with 22 against.

In England, Roma, defeating Stoke City for the second time, were the only Italian club to succeed and the goals total in the English matches were 40 against 13.

The English clubs' was unnaturally boosted by Blackpool's record breaking 10-0 win over Lanerossi Vicenza and Leicester City's defeat of Atalanta.

win the Anglo-Italian League Clubs Tourna- a happy justification of the experiment in which off-side applied only inside a line across the edge of each penalty area.

In the Competition's 25 matches, 96 goals were scored-an average of just under four per match.

The refereeing, both by Italian and English officials was of a predictably high standard and perhaps the only real criticism of the Tournament could be in its timing.

Clubs from both countries suggested that players were tired after a long season and it became evident that if the Tournament could be played before the end of May, clubs of higher calibre would be attracted, the players would perform with more determination and public interest would be enhanced.

Even so the overall attendances fully justified the continuance of the Tournament and the total attendances of 300,000 brought the overall figure in the Tournament's three years to over 1,000,000.

The receipts of £177,000 for 1972 brought the aggregate to over £500,000.

Clearly all competing clubs have benefited financially and in experience from the Tournament. As Frank Dickinson, the Chairman of Blackpool the beaten finalists, declared to the British Press: "Our two years in the Competition have been enjoyable and rewarding and we certainly hope to be invited again."





Organisation of the Competition

The name of the Competition is "The Anglo-Italian Inter-League Clubs' Competition" and organised by the Football League and the Italian League.

The Competition shall be endowed with a Cup which shall be presented to the winning club in the final-tie and retained for one year.

The holder of the Cup shall qualify to enter the next following Competition.

Laws of the Game

The matches shall be played in conformity with the Laws of the Game promulgated by the International Football Association Board.

The matches shall be of 90 minutes duration, but any match which from any cause whatever falls short of 90 minutes duration may be ordered to count as a completed fixture, or, be replayed in full as the Organising Committee may, in their absolute discretion, determine.

A club may nominate up to five substitute players, any two of which may, at the discretion of the club, be used at any time in the match or during the Penalty Kicks Competition, expect to replace a player who has been suspended away. from the game by the Referee.

Match System

The 16 teams taking part in the Competition shall be divided into two groups of eight teams, each group consisting of four English and four Italian clubs. The allocation of teams to the groups shall be made by the Organising Committee.

The system of play shall be the League System (addition of points).

In accordance with the scheme drawn up by the Organising Committee each English club shall play the four Italian clubs in their group. two of the four at home in England and the other two away in Italy:

and each Italian club shall play the number of goals away, extra time four English clubs in their group, of two periods of 15 minutes shall two of the four at home in Italy and then be played after the second two away in England, with two match, and if the score is still level points awarded for a win, one point at the end of extra time, the team for a draw, no points for a loss.

The English club with the best record of points in group one shall play the English club with the best record of points in group two in a semi-final in England home and away; and the Italian club with the best record of points in group one shall play the Italian club with the best record of points in group two in a semi-final in Italy home and

In the event of two or more English or Italian clubs obtaining the same number of points in the qualifying matches, the clubs to play in the semi-final shall be decided in the following order:

- (a)—the goal difference; goals scored for minus goals scored
- (b)-greatest number of goals, home and away;
- (c)-greatest number of goals away from home;
- (d)-lots to be drawn.

In the semi-finals if the two teams have scored the same number of goals at home and the same

to proceed to the final will be decided by a Penalty Kicks Competition governed by the following regulations:

- (a)—The Referee shall choose the goal at which all of the penalty kicks shall be taken.
- (b)-The Referee shall toss and the team whose captain wins the toss shall take the first of five penalty kicks. The two teams shall alternate in the taking of penalty kicks against the goalkeeper of the opposing team until five kicks by each side shall have been taken.
- (c)-Each kick shall be taken by a different player of the same team from amongst those already in the team at the end of the match, including extra time, and these shall be the eligible players for the purpose of the Competition.
- (d)—If after each team has taken five kicks each and has scored the same number of goals, the taking of penalty kicks shall continue, in the same team order until such time as each team has taken the same number

of kicks and one team has scored a goal more than the other. Not until all eligible players of any team, including the goalkeeper, have taken a kick may a player of the same team take a second kick.

- (e)-Any player who was on the field at the end of the match may change places with his goalkeeper at any time during the taking of the penalty kicks.
- (f)-All players, other than the two goalkeepers and the player taking the kick, shall remain within the centre circle whilst the taking of the penalty kick is in progress.
- (g)-The goalkeeper who is a colleague of the player taking the kick shall take up position outside the penalty area, behind the line which runs parallel with the goal line, and at least ten yards from the penalty spot.
- (h)-During the Penalty Kicks Competition substitutes may be used in accordance with the provisions of Article three, paragraph

The winner of the English semifinal and the winner of the Italian semi-final shall compete in the Final of the Competition.

The Final tie shall be decided by a single match. If after the statutory playing time and extra time of two periods of 15 minutes, the result is a draw, the holders of the trophy shall be decided by a Penalty Kicks Competition.

Period of the Matches

The Organising Committee shall arrange the dates of the matches which will normally take place between February and June.

The teams must arrive in the country at least 24 hours before the match is to be played.

Kick-off times will be decided by the Organising Committee in consultation with the Home club.

The Final tie shall be played at a venue and on a day and at a time to be determined by the Organising
