SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST

### RANGERS REPORT

#### Another article in our series from the top columnist

#### Terry Mancini

After meeting him you feel that if the main stand fell on Terry Mancini he'd come up smiling. Better known to the players as Henry, after his musical counterpart, Terry told me jokingly when I interviewed him for this piece: "Earlier in the season I was going to have a go at the crowd. But they're eating out of my hands now so I'm all for them. You're only as good as your last game".

And it was that last game at Loftus Road against Portsmouth that suddenly turned Mancini into the crowd's favourite. For one thing he scored a goal! But that is something I've felt has been coming for a long time. Against Blackpool it was only a defender kicking a shot off the line that prevented Henry getting one that day. But against Portsmouth things were very different. First of all he made one when he overlapped and centred causing a misunderstanding between goalkeepr and full back which resulted in an own goal. Then came the best moment of his season so far. Gerry Francis took a kick near the corner flag on the right and sensing this was his moment Henry ran through and met the ball with his head just outside the six yard line.

And the crowd will be glad to know that Henry puts part of that goal down to them: "They willed it for me. I just felt that at last they were really behind me. I've taken a lot of criticism this season. It's the first time for a long time, in fact since years ago when I was at Watford. The crowd has had a go at me and I've had to live with it. I know I'm not the greatest centre half in the game, but I always give one hundred per cent.

"I take some stick from the Press, for instance the cup game against Derby when they said I would struggle through the game, to be truthful I was quite pleased with my performance that day. The trouble is everyone was watching me, and with my head I stand out like a beacon".

"You can mistake Terry Venables for Gerry Francis and the other way around but you can't mistake me".

As a matter of fact I thought Henry had a good game up at Derby. Roger Davies only scored once, and at that time he was right in form. The first 36 minutes was a massacre of the innocents but I noticed that Henry won several balls in the air against Davies, and was by no means the worst man in the defence.

And he has done a workmanlike job for Rangers in a season when the perennial centre half problem reached a new crisis point. Yet he was almost sold before the season started: "I almost joined Charlton pre-season. We couldn't come to terms. Then

three or four weeks after the start of the season Charlton were doing poorly and they asked for me again, but Gordon said he didn't want to transfer me. What had changed his mind was that, although we'd started off the season well enough, he only had Ian Evans and Ronnie Hunt had just started training again. So he had no experienced cover. As it happened it turned out well for me because I got in the side. Then Ian broke his ankle in training and finally Ronnie Hunt was forced to give up the game'.

All this time Henry has been quite aware that Rangers have been searching for a centre half, yet he has not complained and he has always played his best. I often wonder how the rest of us would feel if we picked up the paper at breakfast one morning and found that our employer was publicly looking for someone to replace us? That is the way it is in professional football.

However, Henry is a realist and as he says: "If they want me to stay for next season then I'll stay. Of course they'll buy someone for the First Division but they'll need experienced cover. To be quite honest if they keep me it will be as standby. They might even sell me but at least I've done my bit".

It is an attitude of mind that is very welcome these days. A player who is prepared to give a club everything of himself despite knowing the final rewards may not be a future with that club. Of course the crowd has every right to express its opinions of a player. But it is worth pausing to note that this continued vocal criticism almost destroyed Mickey Leach in the past. Yet now he is one of the most popular players in the club. And it looks as if at the last moment Mancini has also become a hero.

Rangers seem to have had a centre half problem as far back as I can remember. At least three centre halves came to replace Ronnie Hunt but Ron put his head down and outlasted them all. Even in this Henry Mancini can find amusement: "At least you can say I'm the first to outlast Ron Hunt".

Off the field Henry now runs a thriving boutique in Kingston: "I call it Mancini's because I like to remain incognito," he says with a laugh. All Rangers fans are welcome and you can find it in Fife Road, Kingston. Meanwhile cheer Henry on to another goal!

### HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE SOMEWHERE?

DEREK BUXTON reviews previous clashes between Rangers and today's opponents

### LUTON TOWN

Luton have not got a very impressive record at Loftus Road. Both teams became founder members of the Third Division in 1920, and when Luton visited Loftus Road on 25th September, 1920, QPR started the first of a hat-trick of victories. They won the first match 4-1, and won the next two 1-0 and 4-0.

In 1924 (the season QPR finished bottom) Luton won 2—0, but this was destined to be one of their few successes. QPR won the next five league and cup matches, and although Luton stopped the rot in 1929 by drawing 1—1, QPR then won six more between 1929 and 1935. In 1936 the sides drew 0—0, and in 1936/1937 (Luton's promotion year) QPR won 2—1.

After the war, the sides didn't meet until 1948, in the fifth round of the cup. 30,564 people squeezed

into Loftus Road. The gates were closed by 1 p.m., and the crowd paid, what was then a record attendance

gate money of £2,844.

The weight of the crowd caused part of the then wooden fencing to collapse, slightly injuring half-a-dozen people. Luton led 1—0 at half-time, but QPR went on to win 3—1 with goals by Danny Boxshall, Cyril Hatton and Billy McEwan.

The first time QPR met Luton in a Second Division league match in 1948 Luton chalked up their

second victory winning 3-0.

OPR gained revenge the next season by reversing the score—with goals by Bert Addinall, Ted Duggan and Cyril Hatton. In OPR's remaining two seasons in the Second Division, both matches ended in draws. When Luton came down to the Third Division in 1963, OPR added to their misery by winning 7—1. Brian Bedford (3), Mike Keen (3, including 2 penalties) and Roger Morgan scored.

Luton then dropped to the Fourth Division, and it wasn't until 1970, after they had climbed back to the Second Division that they met QPR again. As in 1948 they celebrated Second Division football with a victory against QPR by the only goal of the match scored by Mike Keen against his old club in the

Last season, as in 1949, QPR reversed the score with a goal by Mick Leach scored in the 44th minute. If the sequence of 1948-1952 is to continue, today's game will end in a 1—1 draw, with one of the Luton players scoring an own goal (unlikely but not impossible).

Away from home, QPR have not won at Luton since 1952. They lost the first seven matches played at Luton between 1920 and 1926 and, although QPR won 1—0 in 1927, they lost the next six games. They drew 1—1 in 1934, lost in 1935, and in 1937 did the double over Luton by winning 1—0.

In the four Second Division games between 1948 and 1952 QPR won twice at Luton, one match was drawn, and Luton won in 1950. In 1963 the sides fought out an exciting 4—4 draw, but in 1965 Luton was 2—0 QPR have drawn their lost three games there 0—0 in 1971 1.5 1 in 1971 (1972) and 2.5 2 this won 2-0. # UNDER CROSCOPE

A detailed Examination of the past record of today's visitors

Defeat at Sunderland, in the sixth round of the F.A. Cup, lowered an atmosphere of anti-climax around the Luton camp. With promotion beyond their grasp, Luton had set their sights on Wembley and it was a bitter disappointment when they fell at Roker.

A few days later they lost an Anglo-Italian Cup game 1-2 in Verona and then they lost 1-3 at home to Bristol City, after leading 1—0 at half-time.

Yet, when viewed in another context, Luton's achievements this season have been considerable. When the club last summer released such outstanding players as David Court, Don Givens and Chris Nicholl—following the departure, a year earlier, of Malcolm Macdonald-it appeared that the Hatters might be in for a bit of a struggle.

But manager Harry Haslam also went into the transfer market as a buyer—and came back with some astute new signings. He bought two defenders, Bobby Thomson and John Faulkner, and two new forwards, John Aston and Rod Fern. More recently he purchased a new goalkeeper, Graham Horn. He also paid a club record £50,000 for striker Barry Butlin who has, unfortunately, been ruled out for several weeks by injury.

They have won more away matches than any other club in the country, apart from Burnley-at Orient (1-0), Nottingham Forest (1—0), Swindon (2—0), Sunderland (2—0), Bristol City (1—0), Aston Villa (2—0), Middlesbrough (1—0), Huddersfield (2-1) and Fulham (1-0) in the League, in addition to F.A. Cup victories at Newcastle (2-0) and Bolton

The Hatters also drew away to Portsmouth (2—2) and Blackpool (1—1) in the League and at Birmingham (1—1) in the League Cup. Their only defeats on opponents' grounds were at Cardiff (1-2), Sheffield Wednesday (0-4), Preston (0-2), Brighton (0-2), Millwall (2-3) and Carlisle (0-2) in the League and Sunderland (0-2) in the F.A. Cup.

Luton Town F.C., formed in 1885, first entered the Second Division in 1897. But they dropped out three years later and didn't return to the League fold until becoming a founder member of Division

Three (South) in 1920.

They had to wait until 1937 before they regained Second Division status which they held until a fantastic finish to the 1954/55 campaign saw them scrape into the First Division on goal-average. Contrary to most people's expectations, Luton made a good impression in the highest sphere and by 1959 they were good enough to earn themselves a Wembley visit to meet Nottingham Forest in the F.A. Cup final.

Luton's fortunes took a drastic turn from that day at Wembley. Twelve months later they were relegated to the Second Division, in 1963 they sank into Division Three and two years laterdisaster, disaster!—they plumetted into

the Fourth Division.

They won the Fourth Division championship in 1968 and two years later gained promotion to Division Two.

#### KEITH BARBER (Goalkeeper)

Keith was signed from Southern League Dunstable Town in April 1971 and was quickly plunged into the bustle of League football. He broke a leg a few weeks ago but made such a remarkable recovery that he was back in the team within six weeks! League record: Luton 49 aps.

#### JOHN RYAN (Defender)

John, a Fulham regular in their First Division days, joined Luton in 1969 and has been ever-present for the past two seasons. League record: Fulham 41(4) aps., 1 gl.; Luton 159(1) aps., 6 gls.

#### JOHN FAULKNER (Defender)

John first sprang to national fame as the centre-half of amateurs Sutton United who met Leeds United in the F.A. Cup three seasons ago. He played so well that Leeds signed him shortly afterwards. When he dropped out of the reckoning for a first-team place he linked with Luton last season. League record: Leeds 2 aps.; Luton 23 aps., 1 gl.

#### DON SHANKS (Defender)

Don, a former England youth international, was once with Fulham as an apprentice. He joined Luton as a professional in July 1970, making his bow last season. League record: Luton 39 aps., 1 gl.

#### KEN GOODEVE (Defender)

Ken was unable to get into the first-team at Manchester United so he transferred to Luton in 1970. After waiting for almost three years he has been playing regularly for the past few weeks. League record: Luton 6(5) aps.

#### **BOBBY THOMSON** (Defender)

Bobby won eight England caps, and made 15 appearances for the under-23s in his Wolves' days. In 1961/62 he made his way into the Molineux club's senior eleven. He joined Birmingham in 1969 and at the end of last season he spent a few weeks on loan to Walsall. League record: Wolves 277 aps., 2 gls.; Birmingham 62(1) aps.; Walsall 9 aps., 1 gl.; Luton 36 aps.

#### PETER ANDERSON (Midfield)

Peter made a quick conversion from non-League circles. Signed from Hendon in 1971, he went immediately into Luton's first-team and last season was their top scorer. League record: Luton 74(3) aps., 12 gls.

#### JOHN MOORE (Midfield)

John arrived at Luton from Motherwell in 1965, holding a regular place until this season when he joined Brighton on loan. But he returned to reclaim his place. League record: Motherwell 4 aps.; Brighton 5 aps.; Luton 266(9) aps., 13 gls.

"The best side we have played this season" (Gordon Jago). The score-line represents a particularly notable achievement as Blackpool,

were no push-overs Spare a thought for a gallant Blackpool side that posed plenty

of first-half problems with the powerful running of Ainscow and the aggressive approach of Rafferty. Yet few Second Division sides can match Rangers, once they smell blood; and they ran Blackpool ragged with the sheer deadliness of their intent up front. From the moment Bowles celebrated his return from a two-match suspension by scoring his 14th goal of the season, in the 55th minute, the issue was in little doubt. Blackpool skipper James must take his share of the blame for failing to head clear from Ven-ables' free kick; and Bowles was left to stab home from ten yards. The second goal was a masterpiece of simplicity and cheek, when Venables chipped a free kick over the Blackpool wall — and Francis nipped round behind to shoot past Wood. Blackpool's Bentley chased referee Raby back to the half-way line, claiming Francis was off-side. But there was no disputing the third goal that was taken so superbly by Thomas, who beat Hatton and Alcock in a run into the area, before shooting past Wood in the 76th minute. Rangers fourth goal although claimed by Thomas was an own goal. ("Sunday Mirror".)

. . . But one couldn't say the same for Portsmouth. The visitors came only to defend but were powerless to stop Rangers' goal blitz.

Portsmouth's ultra defensive attitude was soon broken by Rangers when they scored within 5 minutes. A free kick floated into the crowded Pompey penalty area and was headed straight out to Thomas, who took his time and halfvolleyed a right-foot shot into the roof of the net. Bowles was hurt by Stephenson's boot as he ducked to head a cross near the foot of the Pompey post. (Danny Blanchflower, "Sunday Express".) Number two came four minutes into the second half. Terry Mancini crossed from the right and Portsmouth defender Brian Lewis stabbed the ball into his own net trying to play it back to Ron Tilsed. Venables grabbed a third in 73 minutes. He played a quick one-two with Dave Clement, burst into the area, and fired in a shot that Tilsed could only part-parry into the net. Five minutes later the ball came out of deep defence via Clement to Mike Leach. He chested it down, controlled it superbly, and fired in a peach of a shot. Mancini rounded off the five-star show when he scored with a searing header following a Francis free kick three minutes from time-the umpteenth foul on Stan Bowles, who collected a cheekbone injury during the afternoon. Dear Sir London, W.7. Continuing the debate on the programme layout, I think the main reason for the success and popularity of Rangers' programme is the superior quality of its contents. Both Tony Pullein's and Michael Wale's articles are first rate. The letters column distinguishes itself by including a fair proportion of mail devoted to serious comment. This is most unlike the banal drivel common to many club programmes (viz. previous comment on Derby County's programme). 
