Eight minutes before the interval, Jackson scored his second, sending Barber the wrong way with a spot kick after skipper Bobby Thomson had brought down McKenzie.

Luton might have initiated a come-back in the second half, but they were given little chance. Forest shot further into the lead with their third goal in the 48th minute—a brilliant diving header from Neil Martin.

And then with one minute to go man-of-the-match McKenzie grabbed the goal he deserved.

Luton's only man of merit, Jim Ryan, was booked for dissent.
